Brian Davis rejoined the Tennessee Media Relations staff on a full-time basis in September 2004, after spending the previous year as an assistant media relations director at Vanderbilt University. With the Commodores, Davis handled the day-to-day media relations duties for the women's basketball and men's golf programs. He also assisted in the hosting of the 2004 SEC Women's Basketball Tournament in Nashville, Tenn., and traveled to Athens, Ga., as the media contact with the VU women's tennis team during its run to the NCAA Final Four.

At UT, Davis is in charge of all publicity efforts for the nationally-ranked softball and soccer programs. The Jackson, Tenn., native is familiar with the Tennessee program after serving for three seasons (2000-03) as an athletic communications graduate assistant and intern working with the Lady Vol basketball team. Since entering the profession in 1999, he has worked as a contact or assistant contact with eight teams over four sports (women's basketball, softball, women's tennis, women's volleyball) that have been to NCAA Final Fours or the Women's College World Series, two NCAA finalists and served as a part of seven Southeastern Conference regular-season or tournament championship teams. Davis earned a bachelor's degree in communications from Tennessee in 1997. He completed work on a master's degree in sport administration from UT in 2002.

RADIO

Lee Softball Stadium is equipped with radio lines and wireless internet access. In order to access these lines, teams interested in doing a radio broadcast of a particular game need to inform the UT Media Relations office in writing at their earliest convenience and no later than five days prior to the contest.

TELEPHONES AND FAX LINES

A long distance telephone line will be available in the press box at Lee Softball Stadium, which is available on a first-come, first-served basis.

STATISTICAL SERVICES

Media guides, flipcards and updated game notes and statistics will be available prior to each game. For fax service, please contact Brian Davis prior to game time. Services provided include statistics generated from The Automated ScoreBook computer statistics program. Game-by-game statistics will be e-mailed back to the sports information office of visiting teams at the conclusion of the day, if requested. If no sports information representative is traveling with the opposing team, arrangements should be made in advance for additional services to be provided in their absence.

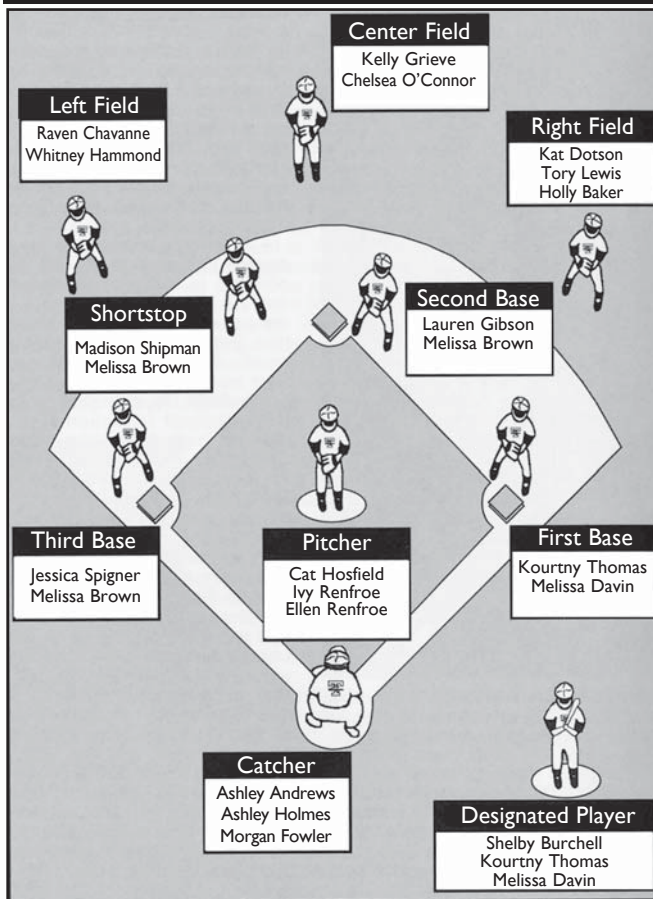

2011 SEASON OUTLOOK



As University of Tennessee Lady Vol softball co-head coaches **Ralph and Karen Weekly** venture into their 10th season at Rocky Top there is a perceptible buzz in the air. The duo has spent years building and shaping Big Orange-clad rosters that have come so very close to meeting the challenge of capturing a Women's College World Series championship.

Behind the leadership supplied by four valuable upperclassmen, the contributions of numerous talented newcomers and role players, and just the right schedule, everything aligned for a magical run that ended with a stunning third-place finish at the 2010 WCWS. Now this program, which endured two straight campaigns that ended short of expectations prior to last year's WCWS appearance, believes it might be the time to witness a long-awaited goal to rise to the top of the collegiate softball world.

Heading into the 2011 season, despite a Lady Vol squad which is long on youth but also exceptionally talented and full of depth, UT has plenty of hope that this could be the year to see the Tennessee flag staked at the very top of the collegiate softball mountain as the first Southeastern Conference program to win that elusive national championship.

It's a difficult assignment for certain, one that requires all the right pieces to fall into place at just the exact moment in time.

In beginning its work toward that goal, 13 letter-winners return from last season's third-place WCWS squad, including seven players that drew at least 31 starts last year. Tennessee also adds seven newcomers in what ESPN/RISE termed the nation's No. 1 ranked recruiting class. Included among the returnees are Louisville Slugger/National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) All-American sophomore outfielders **Raven Chavanne** (.455 avg., 64 runs, 37 steals) and **Kat Dotson** (.391 avg., 37 RBIs, 29 thefts), fellow NFCA All-Southeast Region selections junior **Jessica Spigner** (3B, .350 avg., 14 doubles, eight HR's, 58 RBIs) and sophomore **Ivy Renfroe** (P, 31-6 record, 2.41 ERA, 235 K's in 232.1 innings), 2010 Southeastern Conference All-Freshman selection sophomore **Lauren Gibson** (2B, .297 avg., eight doubles, six HR's, 39 RBIs) and past all region selection senior **Kelly Grieve** (CF, .373 avg., 59 runs, 12 doubles, 26 steals).

"This is going to be an interesting and exciting year for Tennessee softball," Lady Vol Co-Head Coach Ralph Weekly said. "It will be interesting because everyone on the roster can play, and almost every position is being challenged for each day in practice. It's also going to be exciting because we could have numerous freshman or sophomores in the starting line-up."

In all Tennessee returns 75 percent of its run production, 77 percent of the hits, 71 percent of the doubles, 84 percent of the triples, 63 percent of the HR's, 69 percent of the RBIs and 85 percent of the stolen bases from the 2010 WCWS team along with every single pitching victory.

Starters return in all three outfield slots, two of the four infield positions (third and second base), at designated player and in the circle for 2011, while the expected everyday catcher gained valuable experience behind the dish during last season.

Expected to contribute immediately, especially on the infield (shortstop and first base) and provide depth in the outfield, in the pitching circle and behind the plate is the high-profile group of freshmen including **Madison Shipman**, **Ellen Renfroe**, **Tory Lewis**, **Ashley Holmes**, **Chelsea O'Connor**, **Melissa Davin** and **Kourtney Thomas**.

"We are really young with just one senior and only two junior position players who have started over half the games in their careers," Ralph Weekly said. "We possess a lot of depth at every position now, especially in the circle. Both returning pitchers saw significant action in key games during the run to the WCWS and have worked hard in the off-season to improve."

"We have been a top defensive team nationally for years, and I expect us to remain very good in that area this season. The SEC is a highly-competitive league that continues to get deeper every year, but I believe we are up to the challenge. I expect us to be extremely competitive, hard-working and motivated game-in and game-out during the 2011 season."

INFIELD/CATCHING: The 2011 Lady Vol infield makeup will be a mixture of battle-tested veterans and high-profile, if collegiately inexperienced, freshman talent. Anchoring the "hot corner" will be a junior 2010 NFCA All-Southeast Region selection that possesses 117 career starts at third base, while a sophomore with 44 games (at the position) of experience is slated to open the year at second. A platoon is expected to be utilized at first base between a pair of highly-touted freshmen. Having guided NCAA Division I in fielding percentage on three occasions since 2005 and consistently rating among the top five nationally proves the Tennessee coaching staff knows how to get the most out of the outstanding talent it has accrued across the diamond.

Already among the UT career top 10 in home runs (22), slugging percentage (.612) and on-base percentage (.444) and closing in on the listing in both doubles and RBIs through her first two campaigns in the Orange & White, Spigner begins her third straight season as the everyday starter at third base. The Santa Clarita, Calif.,

native continued her impressive production at the plate in 2010 by hitting .350 with team highs in doubles (14), home runs (eight) and RBIs (58) on her way to Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-Southeast Region status. She led Tennessee with 17 multi-RBI games in 2010 to go along with 14 multi-hit efforts and will be expected to remain a key RBI-producer in the middle of the line-up for the Lady Vols in 2011.

Having played 44 games at second base as a freshman last year without making a single error over 108 chances, Gibson will be expected to continue providing her consistent efforts on the interior of the infield into the new campaign. Also in possession of a powerful bat, the Pasadena, Md., product registered a .297 batting average last year with eight doubles, six HR's and 29 RBIs in being tabbed to the SEC All-Freshman team. She even stepped up her play during the postseason, leading the Lady Vols during the WCWS by hitting .444.

Lauded as the No. 2 recruit in the country by ESPN/RISE and hailing from the softball hotbed of California, Shipman is being penciled into the line-up as the starting shortstop entering her initial campaign at Rocky Top. She garnered ESPN/RISE first-team All-America honors in 2010, was a 2008 Louisville Slugger/NFCA Honorable Mention All-American and was both a 2008 & 2010 NFCA first-team All West Region selection. Shipman was named first team All-California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) as well as Cal-Hi Sports All-State and to the All-Foothill League Team in 2008, 2009 & 2010. Following her senior campaign ('10), she was chosen as the CIF Southern Section Division 1, The Santa Clarita Valley Signal and Foothill League Player of the Year. The 6-1 native of Valencia, Calif., was one of six finalists for the Cal-Hi Sports' Ms. Softball State Player of the Year after hitting .444 overall with nine home runs, 39 runs scored, 32 stolen bases and 36 RBIs as a senior. She should also have instant chemistry with her teammate on the left side of the diamond (Spigner), as both played together on the 2007 USA Today National Championship squad at Valencia High School.

"Madison is a tremendous young player who excels in all facets of the game," Ralph Weekly said. "She owns a strong, accurate throwing arm, quick feet and soft hands, has the ability to hit for both average and power and will be expected to contribute immediately this season."

Thomas has been locked in a battle with several players at first base, among those **Shelby Burchell** and **Davin**, throughout the preseason. The former, a native of Warner Robins, Ga., wrapped up her senior season at Houston County High School with a .370 batting average and six home runs while guiding her squad to its fourth consecutive Region 1-5A title (2006, 2007, 2008, 2009) and a Georgia Class 5A State runner-up finish. The 2009 Macon Telegraph All-Middle Georgia Softball Player of the Year, Thomas helped lead her high school squad to 102 overall victories over four seasons as well as the school's initial "Elite Eight" appearance in the Georgia State Girls Softball Tournament in 2006 while starting 132 of her team's 135 total games during her career. She was twice chosen first-team Georgia High School Association (GHSA) All-State (2008, 2009) and was selected first-team all-region three times (2007, 2008, 2009).

"Kourtney is a strong, versatile athlete with soft hands and a strong throwing arm," Ralph Weekly said. "She can play any infield position except second base, has the ability to hit for power and could eventually challenge for a starting position this year."

Burchell hit .264 during her sophomore campaign in the Orange & White while recording four home runs and 23 RBIs over 48 games played (31 starts).

Often penciled in at the designated player position, she did see eight games of action behind the plate, played four contests in the outfield during 2010 and is versatile enough defensively that she could easily start the season as the everyday first baseman. The Columbia, Tenn., product registered seven multi-RBI and three multi-hit contests last year, including back-to-back four-RBI efforts in victories over Campbell and Austin Peay. She enters her junior year with career marks of a .259 average, five doubles, nine HR's and 48 RBIs and is expected to provide another power bat in the line-up and occasionally off the bench as necessary in a pinch-hit capacity.

A native of Fresno, Calif., Davin demonstrated her impressive softball capabilities by breaking every major offensive school record at Clovis East H.S. The right-handed slugger concluded her senior campaign in 2010 with a .537 avg., 51 hits, 32 runs scored, eight doubles, six triples, 13 RBIs, 27 stolen bases and an .811 slugging percentage on her way to being tabbed as Cal-Hi Sports first-team All-State in California. She was a three-time Cal-Hi Sports All-State (2008, 2009, 2010), three-time all-county (2008, 2009, 2010) and four-time all-league (2007, 2008, 2009, 2010) selection and even started the 2009 campaign a perfect 15-for-15 at the plate to set a CIF record.

"A player that possesses all the tools, Melissa is a good hitter and a solid corner player with a good arm," Ralph Weekly said. "She is adapting to the college game and will be a valuable player in the future."

One of the most valuable players on the team because of her versatility this season will be **Melissa Brown**.

2011 SEASON OUTLOOK

A talented sophomore, the Valencia, Calif., native is capable of playing all four of the infield positions and saw 26 games of action at second and 21 contests at short during her rookie campaign at Rocky Top. She posted a .286 average with five doubles, 16 runs scored and five RBIs in limited at-bats in 2010. Having returned for her sophomore season even stronger and faster, Brown is expected to continue her offensive improvement at the plate for the Big Orange this year.

Following the graduation of last year's everyday catcher Tiffany Huff, the reins of the position have been passed along to junior **Ashley Andrews**. Originally recruited out of high school as a catcher, the Tumwater, Wash., native has spent her previous two intercollegiate campaigns doing an outstanding job at shortstop. She saw action in 11 games behind the dish in 2010 and started 58 of 62 contests. Andrews hit just .213 overall but demonstrated power potential, as 11 of her 26 total hits were of the extra-base variety, including four home runs, while she tallied 20 RBIs. Despite the batting average her solid eye at the plate was demonstrated via a .353 on-base percentage and having drawn 24 walks.

Expected to back-up Andrews at the catching position this season are Holmes, a freshman, potentially Burchell and sophomore **Morgan Fowler**.

Another product of the state of California, Holmes comes to Knoxville having helped lead her La Serna High School squad to the 2008 California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) Southern Section championship. One of five Lady Vols listed at 6-0 or taller this season, she posted a .420 batting average during her '08 interscholastic campaign with three home runs, eight stolen bases and 19 RBIs and was responsible for the eventual game-winning, two-run homer during the opening inning of the CIF title tilt. Holmes picked up selections as a senior in 2010 to the Cal-Hi Sports All-California Softball Third Team and the All-CIF Southern Section Division 2 First Team as a catcher. She was tabbed as a 2008 first-team All-CIF selection, was a three-time first-team All-Del Rio League choice (2007, 2008 and 2010) and was included on the 2008 and 2010 *Whittier Daily News* All-Area squads.

"A quality young catcher, Ashley owns a strong throwing arm and has solid fundamentals behind the plate," Ralph Weekly said. "She is experienced at handling pitchers and is a good hitter with power potential."

A native of Camden, Tenn., Fowler is listed as a utility player on the roster because of her defensive versatility. She drew playing time in six games for the Orange & White in 2010 while receiving six at-bats as a pinch hitter. She recorded a pair of hits, including an RBI single during a victory over Western Carolina and her initial career double on the road at Tennessee Tech.

OUTFIELD/DESIGNATED PLAYER: Perhaps the position with the most depth for the Big Orange entering 2011 is found in the outfield as UT returns a pair of 2010 Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-Americans in Chavanne (left field) and Dotson (right field) and a high-profile All-American-level senior in Grieve (center field) who is the unquestioned team leader for the program both on and off the field of play. A pair of freshmen, O'Connor and Lewis, will join sophomore **Whitney Hammond** and junior **Holly Baker** in a spirited battle for playing time among an experienced group of contributors.

The glue in the center of the outfield and the usual No. 2 in the batting order, Grieve is set to begin her final campaign in the Orange & White as the player the coaching staff looks at to provide the example via her outstanding work ethic, grit and hustle. A two-time pre-season inclusion on the USA Softball National Collegiate Player of the Year Watch List, the Asheville, N.C., native continued her All-America level of play last season by hitting .373 with 59 runs scored, 78 hits, 26 stolen bases and a career-high 12 doubles, three HR's and 30 RBIs. She tallied 26 multi-hit and nine multi-RBI games and proved at her best during the biggest of games, as per usual, by hitting .414 over nine NCAA match-ups, including .333 at the WCWS, and .429 at the SEC Tournament. A career .367 hitter, Grieve rates 11th in the Tennessee record books in batting average and is currently fifth in both stolen bases (83) and triples (eight). She's proven equally adept in the classroom, having garnered 2010 ESPN Academic All-District IV honors for her efforts while on a demanding pre-vet/animal science track.

On her way to 2010 Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-American, NFCA All-Southeast Region, All-SEC and SEC All-Freshman honors as well as being named a Top 25 Finalist for the 2010 USA Softball National Collegiate Player of the Year trophy, the normal lead-off batter Chavanne hit a team-leading .455 overall with a squad-

best 95 hits, 64 runs scored, five doubles, five triples, three home runs and 26 RBIs while swiping a UT-best 37 stolen bases and posting a .511 on-base percentage in her initial campaign at Rocky Top. The Thousand Oaks, Calif., native was among the NCAA Division I batting average leaders all season long, eventually finishing at No. 7 in the country while also rating No. 19 in the NCAA in runs per game (1.0) and 26th in stolen bases per game (0.58). Chavanne guided the Lady Vol squad in multi-hit games with 29, including a quartet of four-hit efforts. She even posted early-season strings of eight consecutive hits, reached over 22 straight plate appearances by hit, walk, error or fielder's choice and posted a UT-best 11-game hitting skein.

Dotson started all 62 games in which she appeared for Tennessee in 2010, compiling an impressive .391 batting average (66-of-169) with 54 runs scored, 66 hits, five doubles, three triples, three home runs, 29 steals and 37 RBIs on the way to Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-America, NFCA All-Southeast Region, All-SEC, SEC Co-Freshman of the Year, SEC All-Freshman and SEC All-Defensive Team (RF) accolades. The Savannah, Ga., native posted 19 multi-hit and 10 multi-RBI games and rated eighth overall in the SEC in hitting, ninth in runs scored and 10th in both hits and on-base percentage (.495). Counting SEC match-ups only, she led Tennessee with a .413 average to rate fifth in the league. Usually penciled in at the No. 3 slot in the batting order, Dotson will again be expected to join forces with Chavanne and Grieve to set the table for the Big Orange offense in 2011.

Having drawn playing time in 34 contests as a freshman last season, Hammond will provide valuable depth to the Lady Vol outfield in 2011. The Chattanooga, Tenn., product hit .318 in limited at-bats with 12 runs scored, seven hits and three stolen bases. A speedy base runner, she was often utilized in pinch running duty and possesses the skills needed to patrol either of the corner positions.

Often a late-inning substitution because of her defensive capabilities, Baker, who received 14 at-bats as a sophomore, returns in a supporting role for her junior season. Having reaped playing time in 52 contests last season, the Broadway, Va., native possesses valuable experience in the outfield gleaned during big games such as in both NCAA Super Regional contests against No. 2 Michigan and in a pair of WCWS match-ups versus No. 9 Georgia and No. 3 Arizona.

An incoming freshman who excites the coaching staff with her promising potential is O'Connor. The 2009 MaxPreps Colorado Class 4A State Softball Player of the Year as a senior after hitting .585 with six home runs and 32 RBIs, the Galeton, Colo., native helped her various interscholastic softball squads to the 2006 Colorado Class 4A State Championship, two consecutive regional titles and state tourney semifinal appearances (2008, 2009) and a pair of district championships (2007, 2008). She was twice named by *The Denver Post* as Class 4A All-State (2008, 2009) while picking up four consecutive selections as 4A All-Northern League (2006, 2007, 2008, 2009).

"An exceptional defensive outfielder who possesses great range and a strong accurate arm, Chelsea is a power hitter with the ability to hit to all fields," Ralph Weekly said. "She will challenge an experienced returning outfielder for playing time."

Another rookie with the potential to contribute immediately in the outfield is Chattanooga, Tenn., product Lewis. A three-sport star at Girls Preparatory School, Lewis joins a quickly growing list of outstanding GPS alumni to have recently come through the Tennessee softball program such as sisters Lillian and Whitney Hammond. Lewis excelled athletically during her high school career while picking up a staggering seven state championship rings, playing a role in four consecutive Tennessee State Division II Class AA softball titles (2007, 2008, 2009, 2010), two Division II AA volleyball titles (2007, 2008) and a 2006 Division II Class AA track championship at GPS. She was twice chosen a Tennessee Sports Writers Association (TSWA) All-State selection, earned a nod among the 2009 *Chattanooga Times Free-Press* "Best of Preps" listing and was chosen as the Most Valuable Player of the 2010 Tennessee-Georgia All-Star Softball Classic.

"Tory is an extremely fast player who has the ability to drop the bunt or hit away from the left side of the plate," Ralph Weekly said. "She's an excellent base runner, covers a lot of ground in the outfield and has a strong throwing arm. She has the ability to contribute in many ways during this campaign."

After receiving the majority of the starts last season at designated player, Burchell is sure to spend some time

in that role during the new season. O'Connor, Thomas and Davin are listed as back-up options at the position on the early depth chart.

PITCHING: A year after entering the season with a lot of untested promise, Tennessee can look to pitching as an expected area of strength beginning 2011. The top two pitchers from last year's Lady Vol WCWS team return, while a promising freshman arrives to provide depth, expecting to form a true "pitching staff" for the Weeklys and pitching coach **Marty McDaniel**.

Ivy Renfroe wasted little time fulfilling many of the lofty expectations that preceded her arrival at Rocky Top prior to the 2010 campaign. The Jackson, Tenn., product registered a sterling 31-6 mark from the circle with a 2.41 ERA and 235 strikeouts in 232.1 innings of work to go along with 15 complete games and six solo shutouts during her freshman season. For her efforts she earned Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-Southeast Region, All-SEC, SEC All-Freshman, All-SEC Tournament and All-Women's College World Series accolades. She became the only pitcher in UT history besides Monica Abbott to post 30 or more wins in a single season or win a game at the WCWS by defeating both No. 3 Arizona and No. 9 Georgia. She wrapped up her initial campaign rated 14th in all of NCAA Division I in pitching victories and fifth in saves (five). Renfroe really arrived on a national level live on ESPN during the opening match-up of the NCAA Ann Arbor Super Regional. The 6-0 right hander flirted with a no-hitter into the seventh inning against the powerful Wolverines before settling for a spectacular two-hit shut-out (5-0). She also registered wins over ranked teams such as #11 Oklahoma (first career win), #16 Ohio State and #16 LSU during the year.

Cat Hosfield provided a solid change of pace last season as a sophomore, countering Renfroe's speed with movement and an outstanding change-up. The Murfreesboro, Tenn., native posted a 17-8 record with a 3.27 ERA and 130 K's over 171.1 innings of work. She made 48 total appearances in the circle with 25 starts, six complete games and a pair of solo shutouts. The 5-9 right hander tied for 11th in all of NCAA Division I in saves with four and posted a perfect 2-0 mark over four NCAA Tournament appearances while tossing 16.2 innings. Hosfield started the deciding game in front of a hostile record crowd of 2,479 at No. 2 Michigan during NCAA Super Regionals, picking up the victory after allowing just two runs on four hits over 4.2 innings against the powerful Wolverines. She also tossed eight innings to garner the triumph in the NCAA Knoxville Regional title tilt win over Louisville.

Joining her sister Ivy at Rocky Top, in-state signee Ellen Renfroe ventures to Tennessee from out of Trinity Christian Academy in Jackson, Tenn. The 2010 Gatorade Tennessee Softball Player of the Year, a 2010 MaxPreps Softball All-America selection and a 2010 second-team ESPN/RISE All-American, Renfroe helped guide TCA to Tennessee Class A State Softball titles in 2006, 2007, 2009 and 2010, a Class A State runner-up finish in 2008 and five consecutive district, regional and sectional championships (2006, 2007, 2008, 2009, 2010). During her high school career Renfroe helped Trinity Christian Academy register five straight 40-win seasons and an overall school record of 224-19, including a sterling 46-1 mark in 2009 and a 49-2 tally in 2010. During her senior campaign (2010), Renfroe finished the year 40-2 overall from the circle with a 0.15 ERA, 545 strikeouts and just 14 walks over 271 innings of work. The 6-0 right hander wrapped up her interscholastic career with a 0.31 ERA, a 115-9 career mark and 1,335 K's from the circle along with more than 20 no-hitters.

"Ellen is a mature young pitcher who has a great mix of pitches," Ralph Weekly said. "She possesses good speed and has the ability to keep hitters off balance. She will definitely challenge our returning pitchers for time in the circle in 2011."

SCHEDULE: As usual the schedule will be a difficult test for the Big Orange as co-head coaches Ralph and Karen Weekly have slated a number of high-profile teams during the early season prior to entering the always rugged SEC schedule.

Believers in always challenging their team to better prepare them for postseason play, the Weeklys have their Lady Vol squad set to battle seven members of the pre-season USA Today/NFCA top 20 and three teams that are currently rated in the top 10. Included in that total for UT are match-ups against No. 20 Stanford on Feb. 20 at the Louisville Slugger Desert Classic in Las Vegas, Nev., contests versus No. 16 BYU and No. 1 and defending national champ UCLA at the prestigious Cathedral City Classic over Feb. 24-26 in Cathedral City, Calif., and regular-season SEC series' against top-10 rated Georgia (April 6), Florida (May 6-8) and Alabama (March 22) as well as No. 19 LSU (April

15-17). Florida, Georgia and UCLA all participated in last season's WCWS at the ASA Hall of Fame Stadium in Oklahoma City, Okla.

As always the early season tournament schedule will see the Lady Vols travel from coast-to-coast during February, while March again includes a home-hosted tournament at Sherri Parker Lee Softball Stadium.

Tennessee's campaign starts in DeLand, Fla., at the Stetson Leadoff Classic where the Big Orange will face off against Michigan State (twice), Boston College and the home-standing Hatters.

Following a quick jaunt back to Knoxville to christen the home schedule on Feb. 15 against in-state foe ETSU, the Orange & White then embark on an 11-day, 11-game road trip to the Louisville Slugger Desert Classic over Feb. 18-20 in Las Vegas, Nev., and the prestigious Cathedral City Classic in Cathedral City, Calif. (Feb. 24-26).

During the event in Las Vegas, Tennessee will face Cal Poly, Boise State, host UNLV, Southern Illinois Edwardsville and nationally-ranked Stanford in the tournament before undertaking a Tuesday contest against Southern Utah.

For the sixth time in program history and the third straight season, UT will find itself among those teams participating in the prestigious Cathedral City Classic, formerly the Palm Springs Classic. Another challenging schedule awaits as Tennessee is scheduled to face defending national champion and preseason No. 1 UCLA, 2010 NCAA Super Regional participant BYU as well as challenging squads UCSB, San Diego State and Loyola Marymount during its three-day stay at Big League Dreams Sports Park.

The Lady Vols finally return home from their marathon journey for a much-needed seven-game home stand that includes the Tennessee Classic over March 4-6.

The stint at Lee Softball Stadium kicks off with a single match-up against Evansville on March 3 before Louisiana-Monroe, Furman, Georgia Southern and the Dutch National Team visit Knoxville for UT's event. The Dutch squad is slated to play exhibitions against each team in the Tennessee Classic with its meeting against the Orange & White scheduled for March 6 at 1 p.m.

After one final out-of-league match-up versus Liberty at home on March 8, it's time to christen the rugged Southeastern Conference grind by venturing up I-75 to Lexington, Ky., for a three-game series against the Kentucky Wildcats. The teams will contest a single game each day over March 11-13, in accordance with the SEC's new policy that eliminated the weekend softball doubleheader.

The remainder of the Orange & White road schedule during league action includes trips to battle Georgia (doubleheader - April 6), Ole Miss (three games - April 8-10), LSU (three games - April 15-17) and Florida (three games - May 6-8).

Conference series slated to be held at Lee Stadium during the 2011 campaign involve Alabama (doubleheader - March 22), South Carolina (three games - March 25-27), Auburn (three games - April 1-3), Mississippi State (three games - April 21-23) and Arkansas (three games - April 29-May 1).

Scattered throughout SEC action are mid-week, non-conference home games against Iowa (two games - March 17-18), Appalachian State (April 13) and Radford (April 19). UT will venture to Nashville, Tenn., on March 15 for a game at Tennessee State and to Clarksville, Tenn., on March 29 for a contest at Austin Peay.

Once the regular-season concludes, Tennessee's goal, as always, is to be among the eight teams that qualify for the annual SEC Tournament to be held over May 12-14 in Oxford, Miss.

The NCAA Tournament schedule opens at campus sites over May 20-22 with NCAA Regionals and follows with the best-of-three Super Regionals from May 27-28. The annual Women's College World Series in Oklahoma City, Okla., will be contested from June 2-8 at the ASA Hall of Fame Stadium in Oklahoma City.

The challenge is there, the competition awaits and the players and staff are eagerly awaiting the first pitch of a new campaign. It's always impossible to know before a season starts just how well a team will mesh together or whether the right pieces will fall into place at just the right time to fulfill the ultimate goal. One thing is for certain, through a lot of hard work, the Tennessee softball program has earned a place in the discussion. Maybe the time will finally prove right in 2011 to take that next big step to the top of the softball mountain.

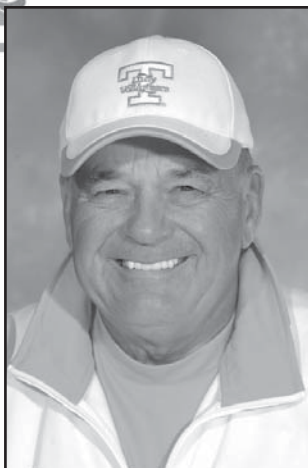

RALPH WEEKLY 10th Year at Tennessee

At 966 career victories and counting venturing into his 24th year as a collegiate head coach, Ralph Weekly enters his 10th season at Tennessee with a prestigious new accolade to include on his already impressive resume. The National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) has chosen to honor his efforts throughout a distinguished, three-decade career, that has spanned from his time in the U.S. Air Force through stops at Pacific Lutheran, Chattanooga and now Tennessee, with a 2011 induction into the NFCA Hall of Fame. Voted in by his coaching peers and with the organization consisting of just 49 previous inclusions, Weekly will join Ithaca Head Coach Deb Pallozzi in ceremonies to be held at the annual NFCA Convention slated for Las Vegas, Nev., late this year.

Looking at his career from just a Tennessee standpoint, the honor would certainly appear well deserved. During their first nine seasons at the University of Tennessee, Weekly and

his wife, Karen, have transformed the Lady Vols from a program searching for an identity into a formidable Southeastern Conference and national contender.

Taking over the reins at UT following a 24-35 campaign in 2001, the Weeklys have steadily improved the Orange & White's fortunes. They guided the Lady Vols through a three-year span from 2005-07 that saw the Big Orange top the 60-win plateau all three times and post both a runner-up finish (2007) and consecutive third-place national finishes at the Women's College World Series (2005, 2006). This past season (2010) the Weeklys made one of the youngest, if not the youngest, teams in the country into a 2010 WCWS participant that ended the year rated No. 3 in the country in the ESPN.com/USA Softball poll after a third-place national finish. The duo has now led the Tennessee program to a staggering 465 wins since entering the league prior to the 2002 season, an average of almost 52 wins per year, and four WCWS berths over the last six campaigns.

The 2010 slate proved a magical ride for an incredibly young squad made up of 19 players, including a total of 15 freshmen and sophomores. The Lady Vols registered a 49-15 overall record (making it eight straight 40+ win seasons) and truly peaked at the right time, rolling through their first seven games of the NCAA Tournament on the way to the program's fourth WCWS berth and another third place national finish. Along the way in NCAA action, Tennessee swept Ball State, Virginia and Louisville during the Knoxville Regional, ended No. 2 Michigan's two-year, 36-game home winning streak by sweeping two consecutive contests in the NCAA Ann Arbor Super Regionals and opened the WCWS with consecutive victories over No. 3 Arizona (9-0, 5 inn.) and No. 9 Georgia (7-5) before being eliminated by the Wildcats just one win from a berth in the best-of-three championship series.

The youthful 2010 squad was guided by a quartet of upperclassmen, including senior catcher Tiffany Huff (NFCA All-South Region choice, .312 avg., seven HR's, 45 RBIs), first baseman Erinn Webb (.318 NCAA Tourney avg., nine total HR's, 34 RBIs) and designated player Nicole Kajitani (three doubles, three HR's, 22 RBIs) as well as junior center field speedster Kelly Grieve (.373 avg., 12 doubles, 30 RBIs, 26 thefts). The team was bolstered, however, by a myriad of high-profile freshmen including Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-American outfielders Raven Chavanne (.455 avg., 64 runs, 95 hits, 26 RBIs, 37 steals) and Kat Dotson (SEC First-Team selection and Co-Freshman of the Year, .391 avg., 54 runs, 66 hits, 37 RBIs, 29 thefts), NFCA All-Southeast Region choices -- pitcher Ivy Renfroe (31-6 record, 2.41 ERA, 15 complete games, 235 K's in 232.1 IP) and third baseman Jessica Spigner (.350 avg., 14 doubles, eight HR's, 58 RBIs) and SEC All-Freshman second baseman Lauren Gibson (.297 avg., eight doubles, six HR's, 39 RBIs).

In her outstanding initial campaign in the Orange & White, Renfroe became the first Lady Vol pitcher not named Monica Abbott to win 30 games in a single season or pick up a victory at the WCWS.

As a team the powerful Tennessee offense recorded a .321 batting average, scored 6.4 runs-per-game, tied the program record for triples with 19 and blasted 51 HR's, coming up just one big fly short of tying the school single-season mark.

During the 2009 season, Tennessee continued its seven-year string of 40+ win campaigns by putting up a 40-18-1 overall record. Once again the Big Orange earned a berth into the NCAA Tournament, the program's sixth straight, falling in the NCAA Regionals. Led by the offensive production of Second Team Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-American Huff (.399 avg., 13 doubles, eight HR's and 67 RBIs), freshman All-Southeast region selection Spigner (UT freshman record 14 HR's) and sophomore All-Southeast Region choice Grieve (.393 avg., 79 hits, 39 stolen bases) as well as 28 victories in the circle from rookie right-hander Cat Hosfield, UT downed such foes as No. 21 Massachusetts, No. 6 Oklahoma, No. 18 LSU and No. 8 Georgia during the year.

The 2008 campaign was a success as the Weeklys guided the Big Orange to a fifth consecutive 50-win season at 50-16 overall and a fifth straight berth into the NCAA Tournament Field of 64. UT advanced to the championship game of its home-hosted NCAA Regional but dropped a 4-2 decision to eventual WCWS-participant Virginia Tech.

Under their tutelage, senior third baseman Tonya Callahan (.465 avg., 62 RBIs) broke

the school record for single-season home runs with 16 in 2008 on the way to being chosen as Tennessee's second consecutive SEC Player of the Year and a finalist for both the USA Softball National Player of the Year trophy and the Honda Award for Softball while reaping UT's 15th Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-America honor since 2004. Senior shortstop Kenora Posey and freshman infielder Jen Lapicki each earned All-SEC accolades. Junior outfielder Lillian Hammond and senior pitcher Megan Rhodes continued the Lady Vol academic tradition by being tabbed as ESPN Academic All-Americans. Hammond, freshman hurler Ashton Ward, sophomore catcher/first baseman Huff and Callahan were all bestowed NFCA All-South Region accolades.

The 2007 season was the benchmark by which all future Lady Vol teams will be compared as the squad finished 63-8 for a new program-best winning percentage of .887. A third-straight trip to the WCWS ended with Tennessee becoming the first Southeastern Conference program to reach the best-of-three NCAA Championship Series, eventually finishing as national runner-up with two wins over No. 4 Arizona and triumphs against No. 6 Northwestern and No. 7 Texas A&M. UT spent a record 11 consecutive weeks at No. 1 in the ESPN.com/USA Softball poll, becoming the first SEC school to reach the lofty top ranking in the league's softball history.

Four players were chosen as Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-Americans in 2007 as Monica Abbott, Lindsay Schutler, India Chiles and Callahan each garnered national honors. Abbott also picked up the prestigious USA Softball National Collegiate Player of the Year award and the Women's Sports Foundation's "Team Sport Athlete of the Year" trophy after registering a 50-5 record with a 0.68 ERA on the year. Chiles was the SEC's Player of the Year after hitting .459 with 44 stolen bases, while Abbott was the SEC's Pitcher of the Year. The Lady Vols led NCAA Division I in fielding percentage, winning percentage and team ERA in 2007, while picking up its first SEC regular-season title with a 23-4 league mark. For their efforts the Weeklys were chosen as the South Division Speedline Coaches of the Year, for the second time in three seasons, and as the SEC Coaches of the Year. Weekly presided over his 800th career coaching victory on March 28, 2007, when UT downed Western Kentucky, 6-0, in Knoxville, Tenn.

In 2006, the Weeklys guided the Lady Vols to a then-program-best single-season winning percentage of .836 after tallying a 61-12 record, UT's initial SEC Tournament title and WCWS victories over #1 UCLA, eventual national champion No. 3 Arizona and No. 9 Arizona State. Tennessee also led NCAA Division I in hitting by posting a staggering .342 team batting average. Pupils Sarah Fekete and Abbott led the country in batting average and pitching victories, respectively, while five Lady Vols were chosen first-team Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-Americans.

The tools and chemistry were thought to be in place for success heading into the 2005 campaign, but youth abounded for UT with a roster completely devoid of a single senior. However, the 2005 season saw Tennessee reap its initial NCAA Regional and Super Regional titles and WCWS berth, tie a then-national record with 67 wins, finish third in the nation in both national polls, garner an impressive four Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-America selections and break a long-standing national mark for single-season shutouts with 51. A Super Regional sweep over No. 4 Stanford in Palo Alto, Calif., and WCWS victories over perennial national stalwarts Arizona, Alabama and eventual national champion Michigan proved that Tennessee, under the direction of the Weeklys, was officially a power to be reckoned with in the softball world. For their efforts the UT coaches were chosen as the 2005 Speedline South Region Coaching Staff of the Year.

In 2004, the club notched a then school-record 55 victories on its way to its first Eastern Division title in five years and its initial trip to NCAA Regionals since 1999. Ralph and Karen were honored as the SEC Co-Coaches of the Year as UT finished with a final ranking of 16th from ESPN.com/USA Softball and boasted its first All-American in freshman hurler Abbott. The 6-3 lefthander registered a staggering 582 K's and 45 victories in her initial campaign at Rocky Top.

Tennessee continued its upward movement in the SEC standings in 2003 and notched then the second-most victories in school history with a 45-25 mark. Despite being overlooked for a spot in the 64-team NCAA field, the Lady Vols made their first appearance at the SEC Tournament in four years and eliminated top-seeded and seventh-ranked Georgia and Auburn before being ousted by WCWS participant Alabama. Most notably, Weekly oversaw the rapid development of catcher/third baseman Kristi Durant, who became the first Lady Vol freshman to be chosen All-SEC. Weekly and his wife were able to develop 16 newcomers, including 14 freshmen, into a cohesive unit that came out of nowhere to fall agonizingly short of NCAA's.

Year one of the Weeklys' rebuilding effort proved to be a preview of better things to

come for the Big Orange, as the tandem directed the squad to a 35-25-1 overall record in 2002 and the club's first winning season since 1999. Having lost the squad's top four hitters from the previous campaign and with their projected pitching ace facing a reduced schedule in the circle due to a torn ligament in her elbow, expectations were minimal. After being picked last in the Eastern Division, Tennessee responded with the best start in the program's seven-year existence at 21-6-1. Although the Orange missed gaining a berth at the SEC Tournament, the incoming class for the 2003 campaign was ranked ninth by *Student Sports Magazine*.

Under Ralph's watchful eye in the batting cages, Adrianna Wilson capped off an outstanding senior campaign by being named to the 2002 NFCA All-South Region team. Chosen to the organization's second unit as a rookie in '99, the Cypress, Calif., native joined Carrie Swinford (1997, 1999) as the lone UT players to reap all-region accolades twice in her career. A first-team choice in her final season, Wilson became UT's initial all-region honoree since 1999.

On June 19, 2001, University of Tennessee Women's Athletics Director Joan Cronan charted a new course for the Lady Vol softball program when she announced the Weeklys as the program's co-head coaches. Since that day, the duo has worked tirelessly toward building UT's reputation on the diamond. "What they accomplished during their tenure at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, including five regular-season Southern Conference championships and five SoCon Tournament titles, speaks for itself," said

Cronan. "They have a passion for the sport of softball and a love for the state of Tennessee that will be an asset as they attempt to turn things around. This combination should help take our program to the next level in collegiate softball."

The Weeklys arrived in Knoxville after shaping Chattanooga's softball team into one of the top programs in the South upon their arrival in 1995. The tandem piloted the Lady Mocs to consecutive NCAA appearances in 2000 and 2001, the first two automatic NCAA Regional berths ever offered to the Southern Conference champion.

In 2001, UTC sported an overall record of 49-18 and was an impressive 4-1 against SEC programs.

After accepting the co-head coaching position at UT, Ralph Weekly announced in August 2001 that he would be stepping down from his post as USA Softball National Teams Director, a position he had held since 1999. Weekly began his administrative stint with USA Softball in August 1998 after taking a leave of absence as head coach at Chattanooga.

Weekly, who is nationally and internationally recognized for his skills as a hitting clinician, was responsible for a variety of national team duties, including the general management of USA Softball's elite level international programs for both men and women. He also served as a liaison to the ASA National Team Selection Committee that is responsible for the elite level selection process for Olympic, Pan American Games and other USA Softball National Teams. In the summer of 2009, Weekly accepted a position on the USA Softball Women's National Teams Selection Committee where he will again assist in choosing the members to the prestigious U.S. softball squads from 2010-12.

Between 1998 and 2001, Weekly worked closely with the U.S. Olympic Committee (USOC) to ensure that USA Softball received adequate funding for its programs and was fully equipped with the technical assistance it needed. He was also instrumental in securing the funding for the development of a state-of-the-art practice facility at the ARCO Olympic Training Center in Chula Vista, Calif. This facility has been used by all of the USA Softball National Teams and will continue to be an integral part of USA Softball's success.

Success has followed Weekly throughout his career, especially as a coach for USA Softball Women's National Teams. Weekly served as the hitting coach and Team Leader for the 2000 U.S. Olympic team that claimed its second-consecutive gold medal in Sydney, Australia. Earlier, he served as the hitting and third-base coach for the U.S. contingent that brought home the gold at the '96 Summer Games in Atlanta.

Under his direction, USA Softball captured the gold medal at the 1994 Pan American Games qualifier in Guatemala. He was an assistant on teams that won additional gold medals at the 1994 World Games in Nova Scotia, the 1995 Pan American Games in Argentina, the 1996 South Pacific Classic in Australia, the 1997 Canada Cup, the 1999 Pan American Games in Winnipeg, Canada, the inaugural 1999 America Cup in San Diego, the 2000 European Championship in Rome, Italy, and the 2001 Hawaii Cup in Honolulu.

As a coach and National Teams Director for USA Softball, Weekly has appeared in 13 international tournaments, winning a gold medal every time. His international coaching record is a sterling 130-15 (.897). He is the only person in collegiate softball to have served on a pair of Olympic gold-medal-winning coaching staffs and to have claimed two national championships as a head coach. He also directed all facets of the USA Men's National Team from 1999-2001.

He has developed High Performance Seminars funded by the USOC to establish consistent coaching philosophies for youth coaches throughout the world. In addition, Weekly has produced several instructional tapes through USA Softball, including "Fundamentals for Future Champions." In December of 2006, Ralph and co-head coach Karen Weekly released a new instructional video entitled "Hitting the Tennessee Way."

He guided the women's East team to a gold medal at the 1994 U.S. Olympic Festival in St. Louis, Mo., one year after taking the North team to a bronze medal in the Festival held in San Antonio, Texas.

Previously, Weekly was the head coach at Pacific Lutheran in Tacoma, Wash., from 1986-94, where he compiled a 310-93 (.769) record and became one of the most successful coaches in NAIA history. In his nine years at PLU, his teams made eight trips to the NAIA Tournament, returning with national championships in 1988 and 1992, and a second-place finish in 1990. His 1991 team was ranked first in the country throughout the season.

Weekly was named the National Softball Coaches Association (NSCA) Small College Coach of the Year in 1993 and was a two-time NAIA National Coach of the Year in 1988 and 1992. Incredibly, he was chosen as the NAIA West Region Coach of the Year eight times in a nine-year span, covering the 1986, 1987, 1988, 1989,



1990, 1992, 1993 and 1994 campaigns.

During the fall, he also served as an assistant football coach at PLU from 1986-93 under legendary head coach Frosty Westerling. During his time spent working on the gridiron, he helped the Lutes to three national title games and a pair of NAIA national championships (1987 & 1993). In his last year he was able to share the title-winning experience with his son Marc Weekly, an All-American quarterback and a player responsible for 10,977 yards of career total offense.

Weekly began his coaching career in the United States Air Force, where he accumulated many championships at a variety of levels. He piloted squads to three All-Armed Forces World Titles, seven state titles at the United States Softball Association (USSA) level and three USSA Western World Championships.

He has served as the chairperson of the Gatorade High School Player of the Year Selection Committee and has published numerous articles in softball magazines and journals. In addition, Weekly has been a featured speaker at the National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) national convention and at various national baseball and softball clinics around the nation. He currently serves as the co-director of the Cherry Hill, N.J., Coaches Clinic which is the largest such event in the country.

Weekly is the founder and director of National Hitting Camps, where he has taught thousands of youths in all 48 of the contiguous states and throughout Canada over the past 20+ years. He was also the Director of ASA Gold Medal Camps that featured hands-on training from U.S. Olympic staff and players from 1996-2001. Well-respected internationally as a clinician, he has represented the USA in clinics in Argentina, Australia, Canada, China, Italy, New Zealand and Taiwan.

Having retired from the United States Air Force in 1986, Weekly was the commander of the Air Force Office of Special Investigations at McChord Air Force Base in Washington, D.C., in his last duty assignment. He was awarded the Bronze Star and Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry for outstanding service in the Vietnam War.

Weekly is a 1973 graduate of Arizona State University and has completed course work for a master's degree in international relations from Pacific Lutheran.

KAREN WEEKLY 10th Year at Tennessee

A 14-year collegiate softball head coach-veteran boasting 688 career wins, Karen Weekly preps to enter her 10th season with her husband Ralph at the helm of the Lady Volunteer softball program. Having guided UT to a staggering 465 victories and four top three national finishes in the annual Women's College World Series (2005, 2006, 2007, 2010), since arriving to resuscitate the program prior to the 2002 season, is concrete proof that tireless recruiting and solid coaching by the experienced Weeklys and their staff have provided huge dividends to the UT softball program.

The recently completed 2010 campaign proved a magical ride for an incredibly young Tennessee squad made up of 19 players, including a total of 15 freshmen and sophomores. The Lady Vols registered a 49-15 overall record (making it eight straight 40+ win seasons) and truly peaked at the right time, rolling through their first seven games of the NCAA Tournament on the way to the program's fourth WCWS berth and another third place national finish. Along the way in NCAA action, Tennessee swept Ball State, Virginia and Louisville during the Knoxville Regional, ended No. 2 Michigan's two-year, 36-game home winning streak by sweeping two consecutive contests in the NCAA Ann Arbor Super Regionals and opened the WCWS with consecutive victories over No. 3 Arizona (9-0, 5 inn.) and No. 9 Georgia (7-5) before being eliminated by the Wildcats just one win from a berth in the best-of-three championship series.

The youthful 2010 squad was guided by a quartet of upperclassmen, including senior catcher Tiffany Huff (NFCA All-South Region choice, .312 avg., seven HR's, 45 RBIs), first baseman Erinn Webb (.318 NCAA Tourney avg., nine total HR's, 34 RBIs) and designated player Nicole Kajitani (three doubles, three HR's, 22 RBIs) as well as junior center field speedster Kelly Grieve (.373 avg., 12 doubles, 30 RBIs, 26 thefts). The team was bolstered, however, by a myriad of high-profile freshmen including Louisville Slugger/National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) All-American outfielders Raven Chavanne (.455 avg., 64 runs, 95 hits, 26 RBIs, 37 steals) and Kat Dotson (SEC First-Team selection and Co-Freshman of the Year, .391 avg., 54 runs, 66 hits, 37 RBIs, 29 thefts), All-Southeast Region choices -- pitcher Ivy Renfro (31-6 record, 2.41 ERA, 15 complete games, 235 K's in 232.1 IP) and third baseman Jessica Spigner (.350 avg., 14 doubles, eight HR's, 58 RBIs) and SEC All-Freshman second baseman Lauren Gibson (.297 avg., eight doubles, six HR's, 39 RBIs).

In her outstanding initial campaign in the Orange & White, Renfro became the first Lady Vol pitcher not named Monica Abbott to win 30 games in a single season or pick up a victory at the WCWS.

As a team the powerful Tennessee offense recorded a .321 batting average, scored 6.4 runs-per-game, tied the program record for triples with 19 and blasted 51 HR's, coming up just one big fly short of tying the school single-season mark.

During the 2009 season, Tennessee continued its string of 40+ win campaigns by putting up a 40-18-1 overall record. Once again the Big Orange earned a berth into the NCAA Tournament, the program's sixth straight, falling in the NCAA Regionals. Led by the offensive production of Second Team Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-American Tiffany Huff (.399 avg., 13 doubles, eight HR's and 67 RBIs), freshman All-Southeast region selection Jessica Spigner (UT freshman record 14 HR's) and sophomore All-Southeast Region choice Kelly Grieve (.393 avg., 79 hits, 39 stolen bases) as well as 28 victories in the circle from rookie right-hander Cat Hosfield, UT downed such foes as No. 21 Massachusetts, No. 6 Oklahoma, No. 18 LSU and No. 8 Georgia during the year.

The 2008 campaign was a success as the Weeklys guided the Big Orange to a fifth consecutive 50-win season and a fifth straight berth into the NCAA Tournament Field of 64. UT advanced to the championship game of its home-hosted NCAA Regional but dropped a 4-2 decision to eventual WCWS-participant Virginia Tech.

Under their tutelage, senior third baseman Tonya Callahan (.465 avg., 62 RBIs) broke the school record for single-season home runs with 16 on the way to being chosen as Tennessee's second consecutive SEC Player of the Year and a finalist for both the 2008 USA Softball National Player of the Year trophy and the Honda Award for Softball while reaping UT's 15th Louisville Slugger/National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) All-America honor since 2004. Senior shortstop Kenora Posey and freshman infielder Jen Lapicki each earned All-SEC accolades. Junior outfielder Lillian Hammond and senior pitcher Megan Rhodes continued the Lady Vol academic tradition by being tabbed as *ESPN the Magazine* Academic All-Americans. Hammond, freshman hurler Ashton Ward, sophomore catcher/first baseman Huff and Callahan were all bestowed NFCA All-South Region accolades. Karen's slap-hitting standouts, Hammond and Posey, were responsible for .362 and .349 averages, respec-

tively, 96 total runs scored and 67 combined stolen bases.

The 2007 season was the benchmark by which all future Lady Vol teams will be compared as the squad finished at 63-8 for a new program-best win percentage of .887. A third-straight trip to the Women's College World Series ended with Tennessee becoming the first Southeastern Conference program to reach the best-of-three NCAA Championship Series, eventually finishing as national runner-up with two wins over No. 4 Arizona and single triumphs against No. 6 Northwestern and No. 7 Texas A&M. UT spent a record 11 consecutive weeks at No. 1 in the ESPN.com/USA Softball poll, becoming the first SEC school to reach the lofty top ranking in the league's softball history.

Four players were chosen as Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-Americans in 2007 as Monica Abbott, Lindsay Schutzler, India Chiles and Callahan each garnered national honors. Abbott also picked up the prestigious USA Softball National Collegiate Player of the Year award and the Women's Sports Foundation's Team Sport Athlete of the Year trophy after going 50-5 with a 0.68 ERA on the year. Chiles was the SEC's Player of the Year after hitting .459 with 44 stolen bases. The Lady Vols led NCAA Division I in fielding percentage, winning percentage and team ERA in 2007 while picking up its first SEC regular-season title. For their efforts the Weeklys were South Division Speedline Coaches of the Year, for the second time in three seasons, and as the SEC Coaches of the Year. Karen Weekly also presided over her 500th career coaching victory on February 24, 2007, when UT downed Michigan State, 3-0, at the Palm Springs Classic in Cathedral City, Calif.

Weekly's tutelage helped guide Tennessee to a then-program-best .836 winning percentage in 2006 at 61-12 overall, a No. 2 national ranking during the regular season and a second consecutive trip to the Women's College World Series in Oklahoma City, Okla., where UT finished third nationally and downed #1 UCLA, #3 Arizona and #9 Arizona State. One of her slap-hitting pupils, senior outfielder Sarah Fekete, led NCAA Division I in batting average at a staggering .500 (110-of-220) as the UT squad combined to lead the country in team hitting at .342. In all three of the top five hitters in the Southeastern Conference by average in 2006 learned under the watchful eye of Karen and co-head coach Ralph Weekly, as Fekete, Chiles (.437) and Schutzler (.409) gave the league statistics a definitive orange tint. Five members of Weekly's team also were selected as first-team Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-Americans to lead NCAA Division I in that category.

UT also achieved another program-first in '06 as the Orange & White raced through the field at the annual SEC Tournament to pick up its first league tournament title with a 3-0 victory over #12 LSU at the UGA Softball Stadium in Athens, Ga. UT hosted the NCAA Regional round at home for the second straight year and added the Super Regionals to the Tyson Park slate after roaring through the opening round a perfect 3-0. The Big Orange faced a serious challenge as defending national champion Michigan ventured to Knoxville for the best-of-three Super Regional series. After downing UM 5-3 and then dropping a tough 5-1 decision to the Wolverines in game two, UT prevailed 1-0 in the finale to send the Orange and White back to the WCWS.

Throughout the Weeklys tenure at Tennessee, the Big Orange have been known for tremendous speed, skyrocketing batting averages and outstanding fielding percentages, as UT led the nation in the latter category in both 2004, 2005 and 2007.

The Orange's and White rapid climb from a 24-win program in 2001 to a national power reached a new peak during a stunning 2005 run to a third-place finish at the Women's College World Series and a national record-tying 67 victories. UT led the nation in fielding percentage (.982), shutouts (51), strikeouts (787) and victories (67) while setting program marks for runs scored (404), hits (678) and stolen bases (127) and tying the single-season record for home runs (52). Tennessee's regular-season efforts permitted the program the opportunity to host the NCAA Regionals at Tyson Park for the first time in UT history. The home field advantage paid dividends as the Lady Vols went 3-0 to advance to NCAA Super Regionals in Palo Alto, Calif., against Stanford. A two-game road sweep over the powerful Pac-10's Cardinal granted Tennessee its first trip to the WCWS. For their efforts the coaches were chosen as the Speedline South Region Coaching Staff of the Year.

The Weeklys were honored as the SEC Coaches of the Year by their peers after directing UT to its first Eastern Division championship since 1999 during the 2004 campaign. The Orange was awarded the second seed at NCAA Regional No. 6 in Ann Arbor, Mich., and collected its first two victories in just the program's second trip to NCAA's. The Lady Vols sported an overall mark of 55-16 and captured tournament titles at their own Lady Vol Classic, the New Mexico State Kick-Off Invitational, the Paradise Classic hosted by the University of Hawaii and the State-Line Classic. Tennessee also reached the semifinal round of the SEC Tournament for the second straight time.

UT continued to climb the ladder of success in 2003, capturing three tournaments and posting several victories over ranked opponents, including league rivals Alabama, Georgia, LSU and South Carolina. Perhaps the most impressive breakthrough occurred as the Lady Vols secured the sixth seed for the Southeastern Conference Tournament and matched their top performance at the event with a couple of triumphs while facing elimination. The Orange were involved in a record four extra-inning tilts during their journey to Plant City, Fla., and managed to oust Auburn and the league's number-one team, Georgia, after dropping regular-season series to the Tigers and Bulldogs.

Continued evidence of the team's progress was

shown by a 34-point increase in batting average from 2002 to 2003 under the Weekly regime and a healthy boost to the squad's power numbers, including the most total bases (787), hits (543), runs batted in (280), runs (310) and doubles (102) since the 1999 edition slugged its way to the Eastern Division crown and NCAA Regional No. 3 in Seattle, Wash.

In their debut campaign, the Weeklys presided over the biggest turnaround in UT's softball history, as the team rebounded from a lackluster 24-35 effort to finish 35-25-1 in 2002. The Lady Vols showed marked improvement in every area — offensively, defensively and in the pitching circle. Despite just one returning starter in her natural position, the rest of the orange-clad players enjoyed a tremendous upswing under the Weeklys' tutelage. In fact, UT registered a team batting average that was 40 points higher than the previous season and recorded a school-record fielding percentage of .965 after shaving a massive 44 errors off its '01 figure. In addition, the club's offensive statistics jumped across the board, including a school-record-tying 52 home runs.

Upon arriving in Knoxville, Weekly brought a wealth of experience gained from being an All-America softball player at Pacific Lutheran University in Tacoma, Wash., a national title-winning assistant coach at PLU in 1988 and 1992, and a championship head coach at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga for five seasons. During her tenure, the Lady Mocs claimed five straight Southern Conference regular-season trophies, four SoCon Tournament plaques and the team made successive appearances at the 2000 and 2001 NCAA Regionals.

After Karen served as an assistant coach at UTC in 1995 and 1996, the Weeklys combined their efforts to direct the Lady Mocs to the top of the SoCon in their first two campaigns in charge of the program together. The 1997 season featured an overall record of 32-19, while the '98 edition registered a school-record 47 victories and three players earned first-team All-South Region accolades.

While Ralph was on a leave of absence from Chattanooga to handle his Olympic duties in 1999 and 2000, the Lady Mocs' program continued to make steady improvement under Karen's tutelage. In her initial season as head coach in '99, UTC led the SoCon with a .303 batting average and a 1.47 earned run average en route to a school-best 48-18 overall record to go along with a spotless 16-0 mark in regular-season conference play. Weekly guided a record six individuals to first-team All-SoCon accolades that season and Chattanooga became the inaugural team to sweep all of the postseason honors issued by the conference office.

In 2000, the Lady Mocs were 47-27 and earned the program's first NCAA Regional berth by winning three-straight games after a loss to Furman to take the SoCon Tourney and secure the initial automatic bid for the conference into the 48-team regional field. Sent to the No. 1 Regional held in Seattle, Wash., the Mocs fell to Mississippi State, 6-1, before bouncing back to knock out Army, 6-4, in nine innings. The squad would later be eliminated at the event after suffering a 2-1 defeat to nationally-ranked Utah. UTC's pitching staff was the key to its success, sporting an impressive 1.58 earned run average with every hurler having an ERA of 1.80 or lower.

In rolling to a 49-18 overall mark in 2001, including four wins in five outings against SEC competition and a triumph over then-third-ranked Alabama in Tuscaloosa, the Weeklys helped the Mocs to another NCAA appearance following Southern Conference regular-season and post-season crowns. Six more Lady Mocs etched their names on the first-team all-league list after UTC racked up an 18-2 ledger in SoCon play and the Weeklys were selected as league Coaches of the Year.

Karen was Ralph's top assistant at Pacific Lutheran from 1987-94 after earning her bachelor's degree in history and political science magna cum laude from the University in 1987. The duo spearheaded the Lutes to NAIA national championships in 1988 and 1992 and a runner-up finish in 1990.

At PLU, where she was known as Karen Kvale, Weekly excelled as a student-athlete. She was named Female Athlete of the Year and led NAIA hitters with a .440 batting average during her All-America senior season. Her skills were not limited to the diamond either, as she was a three-year starter on the basketball team.

With a 3.8 grade point average, Weekly was a two-time Academic All-American, garnering honors in 1986 and 1987. In both '85 and '86, she was the recipient of the prestigious Pacific Lutheran University Undergraduate Fellow/Division of Social Sciences Award.

She later earned her juris doctor degree from the University of Washington's School of Law in 1990. At Chattanooga, Weekly was an assistant professor in the College of Business Administration from August 1995 until May 2001, where she taught a course entitled the "Legal Environment of Business." Between 1996-99, she served on the UTC Faculty Committee on Student Rating of Faculty Instruction. In addition, Weekly was an administrative law judge and a member of the school's Gender Equity Committee from 1996 until her departure from Chattanooga. She remains an administrative law judge at the University of Tennessee.

Previously, she was an associate attorney at Grant, Konvalinka & Harrison in Chattanooga from November 1994 to August 1995 after working in a similar capacity at Williams, Kastner & Gibbs in Seattle from September 1990 through November 1994.

Weekly holds memberships in the National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA), where she has held several committee positions, and the Academy of Legal Studies in Business. She is a member of the American Bar Association and is permitted to practice law in the states of Tennessee and Washington.

Having traveled all over the nation to spread her knowledge about the sport, Weekly has been a co-owner and director of National Hitting Camps since 1988. She also has been a lead instructor at ASA Elite Hitting Camps in Midland, Texas, and in Oklahoma City, Okla., and has been a featured speaker at several coaching clinics around the country. She has spoken at the "Be the Best You Are" clinic in Cherry Hill, N.J., during each of the last six years, covering such topics as developing power and bat speed, the short game, scouting opponents and developing a rapport between the coach and players.

In December 2007, Weekly released a video entitled "The Tennessee Slap Attack," an instructional tape teaching the fundamentals of slap-hitting.

MARTY McDANIEL Seventh Year at Tennessee

Lauded for his teaching ability and his overall knowledge of the game, Marty McDaniel continues to provide his outgoing personality and boundless enthusiasm to the Lady Vol softball program as a seventh-year assistant coach on the staff of Tennessee Co-Head Coaches Ralph and Karen Weekly. A former head coach at Division II Armstrong Atlantic State University (Ga.), McDaniel's experience as both a coach and as a men's fastpitch veteran has been invaluable to the UT efforts.

During his time on the UT softball staff, McDaniel has been vital to the program's stunning success. His pitching pupils such as standouts Monica Abbott, Megan Rhodes, Ashton Ward, Cat Hosfield and Ivy Renfro have helped extend Tennessee's streak of 40+ win seasons to eight venturing into the 2011 campaign. During his six years at Tennessee (2005-10) his staffs have led the nation in ERA

and strikeouts (2007), set a national record for shutouts (51 in 2005) and helped the Big Orange to 330 total victories, an average of 55 wins-per-season.

Faced with an young and inexperienced staff consisting of returning sophomores Cat Hosfield and Jessica Spigner and two incoming freshmen, Ivy Renfro and Andi Williamson, McDaniel helped the 2010 group settle in to post 49 wins, the league's fifth-best ERA at 2.78 and 12 shutouts. His new pupil Renfro truly thrived under his direction, posting a 31-6 mark with a 2.41 ERA, 15 complete games and 235 strikeouts over 232.1 innings of work. The Jackson, Tenn., native became the first Lady Vol pitcher not named Monica Abbott to win 30 or more games in a single season and post a victory at the annual Women's College World Series. The 6-0 right hander registered perhaps her finest effort during NCAA Super Regionals at No. 2 Michigan, flirting with a no-hitter for 6.1 frames before settling for a two-hit shutout to end the powerful Wolverines two-year, 36-game home winning streak. Renfro also three-hit eventual national finalist No. 3 Arizona in UT's WCWS opener as Tennessee rolled past the Wildcats, 9-0 (5 inn.). Hosfield was solid from the circle in support in 2010, registering a 17-8 overall mark with a 3.27 ERA with six complete games and 130 K's in 171.1 innings. During her campaign, the Murfreesboro, Tenn., product posted victories over high-profile foes including No. 15 Texas, Illinois State, Ole Miss, Auburn, No. 4 Florida, Louisville and No. 2 Michigan. Typically a third baseman, Spigner recorded a pitching win over Austin Peay and picked up a crucial save during a 5-4 home triumph over No. 9 Georgia, while Williamson allowed just a single tally in five innings of work over three appearances.

Rookie righthander Hosfield led the way for the Lady Vol pitching crew in 2009, posting a 28-13 record with six solo shutouts and 221 strikeouts in 257.1 innings of work. She tied for 12th in NCAA Division I in wins, second in the Southeastern Conference in victories, rated fourth in strikeouts (221) and 11th in opposing batting average (.222), while posting high-profile victories over No. 6 Oklahoma (twice), No. 15 Massachusetts, No. 18 LSU (twice), No. 25 Kansas and Auburn (three wins). Included in her SEC All-Freshman campaign was a hard-fought 2-1 defeat to eventual national champion Washington, during which Hosfield allowed just two runs on seven hits in a duel with 2009 USA Softball National Player of the Year Danielle Lawrie. Forced to look further into the staff as the long '09 season wore on, he helped senior Danielle Pieroni to an 8-3 mark over 57 innings of work after she entered the year with all of 22.2 frames of collegiate pitching experience. He even helped freshman Spigner, who hadn't thrown in a pitch in nearly a year, contribute 16 innings, including a big 6-3 win at No. 8 Georgia.

His charges in the circle helped guide Tennessee to a fifth consecutive 50-win campaign in 2008 while posting 17 shutouts, a 2.10 team ERA and 431 K's in 437.0 innings of work. Freshman righthander Ward spent the season among the SEC win leaders and finished 25th in NCAA Division I in victories by going 27-5 overall with a team-best 1.88 ERA and 187 strikeouts. Senior Rhodes was responsible for 23 triumphs, 213.1 innings of work and 233 K's. The Nashville, Tenn., native concluded her time wearing the Orange & White firmly entrenched in the Lady Vol top four in career wins, K's, shutouts, ERA, appearances, starts and winning percentage. Junior Pieroni demonstrated improvement in the circle during 2008 by working 19.1 frames and highlighting her year with 2.2 innings of scoreless relief in an exhibition contest against the U.S. Olympic Softball Team.

During the 2007 drive to a runner-up national finish at the Women's College World Series, McDaniel helped the Tennessee staff to an NCAA-best 0.88 ERA to go along with 63 wins, 41 shutouts and a national single-season record strikeout-per-seven-inning ratio of 13.55 on 910 combined K's over 470 innings of work. His pupils in the circle, Abbott and Rhodes, finished first (14.1) and fourth (11.7), respectively, in K-per-seven-inning ratio in the country. Senior Abbott led the way in single-season strikeouts with an NCAA record 724. She completed her stay in the Orange & White as the NCAA career leader in wins (189), strikeouts (2,440), shutouts (112), appearances (253) and innings pitched (1,448.0). Rhodes struck out 186 batters over just 111.2 frames of work while going 13-3 with a 1.50 ERA. The duo also combined to hurl eight no-hitters, including three perfect games (two for Abbott, one for Rhodes). For his efforts, he was named as part of Speedline's South Region Coaching Staff of the Year for the second time in three seasons (2005).

His pitching staff continued their stellar work in the circle during UT's run to the WCWS in 2006 by leading the league in ERA at 1.12 with a 61-12 overall record, 37 shutouts and 682 strikeouts. Junior All-American Abbott led the nation in victories with 44 and broke the SEC career records for K's and triumphs during the regular-season after posting a 44-10 mark with 531 K's. Sophomore Rhodes continued her rapid improvement by going 17-2 overall with a 1.40 ERA and 148 strikeouts in just 120 innings of work. The staff hurled three consecutive no-hitters during the title-winning USF adidas Tournament and almost got a fourth straight as a bloop single by UMass in the fifth inning of the championship contest broke up the amazing bid.

Working primarily with the pitching and catching positions during the record-setting 2005 campaign, McDaniel instructed a group of hurlers that broke a long-standing national record for shutouts with 51 blankings while helping guide UT's initial advance into the WCWS. The first-year McDaniel's charges combined for 67 victories in the circle with an overall ERA of 0.79 and 787 strikeouts in 547.0 innings. Sophomore Abbott became the program's first two-time, first-team All-American after leading the nation in victories (50), shutouts (34), strikeouts (603) and innings pitched (392.0). Rookie pitcher Rhodes posted 14 victories and 125 K's on her way to SEC All-Freshman honors.

Granted the responsibility of building the softball program at Armstrong Atlantic State

LADY VOL ASSISTANT COACHES



(Ga.) from its infancy in 1998, McDaniel turned the AASU varsity program into a winning machine that captured its initial Peach Belt Conference championship in 2000, garnered four NCAA Championship berths (2000, 2002, 2003, 2004) and achieved a No. 1 ranking in the National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) poll during the 2000 campaign. His conference-winning squad in 2000 picked up an impressive 51 victories against just seven losses and registered an 18-2 league mark in PBC play.

With the assistance of four All-Americans, McDaniel's 2004 AASU squad advanced all the way to the South Atlantic Regional. Record-setting senior pitcher Katya Eronina picked up her second-consecutive first-team NFCA All-America honor while a pair of seniors, Stacey Richardson and Kissy Stepanova, garnered second-team All-America awards. Junior second baseman Stacy Oliver was selected as a third-team All-American.

During the 2003 campaign, AASU utilized the pitching of NFCA All-America Eronina, the Division II leader in earned-run-average, to advance to the South Atlantic Region final. The Pirates achieved a final ranking of 16th and completed the season at 41-13 overall.

All-Americans Annie Sells and Richardson helped guide the 2002 version of McDaniel's Pirates to a No. 2-seeding at the South Atlantic Regional and another final ranking of 16th. AASU registered the best won-lost record in Division II with a 40-7 mark while Richardson was the NCAA's DII home run champion with a school-record 16 round-trippers. The squad finished with a 15-2 mark for a second-place finish in the Peach Belt Conference.

The 2000 South Atlantic Coach of the Year, McDaniel has had experience on the Weeklys' staff before as he joined AASU from the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga. During his two-plus year stint on the staff of then Head Coach Ralph Weekly, also a U.S. Olympic Assistant Coach, Chattanooga won two Southern Conference Championships.

A native of Chattanooga, Tenn., McDaniel received his Bachelor of Science degree from Carson-Newman College in 1989 and also assisted with the baseball team as a coach for two seasons. As a top-rated pitcher, McDaniel has made numerous all-region squads in the sport of men's fastpitch softball.

During 2008 he was honored in a ceremony at Armstrong Atlantic State as a coaching inductee into the softball program's "Wall of Fame."

McDaniel and his wife, the former Kelly Stewart, currently reside in Knoxville, Tenn. The pair have a child, Lindsey Jo, who was born during the 2005 softball campaign.

**Volunteer Assistant Softball Coach
Seventh Year at Tennessee**

Marc Weekly begins his seventh season as a member of the University of Tennessee Lady Vol softball staff in the capacity of a volunteer coach after working with Co-Head Coaches Ralph and Karen Weekly in camps and summer clinics for over 15 years. He will work primarily with UT's catchers and outfielders and will also assist with hitting instruction.

Weekly started at quarterback at Pacific Lutheran University for four seasons (1990-93) during which he led the Lutes to four NAIA Division-II national playoff appearances and two national championship games. In 1993, he guided PLU to the program's third NAIA Division-II National Championship and was named the Most Valuable Player in each contest during the squad's playoff run. The 1993 first-team All-American was accountable for six touchdowns in the title tilt, throwing for four scores and running for two more in a 50-20 rout of Westminster, Pa., in Portland, Ore. Weekly continues to hold season and career records at Pacific Lutheran for most passing yards (3,722 in 1993; 9,737 from 1990-93), most touchdown passes (46 in 1993; 115 from 1990-93) and most total offense (4,065 yds. in 1993; 10,977 from 1990-93).

Following his collegiate experience at Pacific Lutheran, Weekly, a former Associated Press Blue Chip Pick in baseball, was offered a minor league contract as a catcher in the Seattle Mariners organization, but turned it down to sign a deal with the Edmonton Eskimos in the Canadian Football League (CFL). After two years with the Eskimos, he enrolled at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga in the master's program and served as a football graduate assistant for two years working with the UTC quarterbacks and kickers.

A 2004 inductee in the Pacific Lutheran University Athletic Hall of Fame, Weekly holds a bachelor's degree from PLU and a master's degree from Chattanooga. He currently resides in Seymour, Tenn., with his wife Cheryl and three children: Jake, Regan and Garrett.

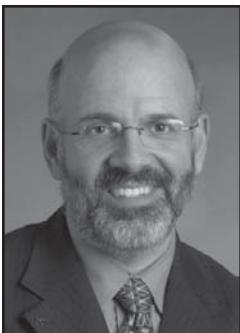


JOE WHITNEY, Ph.D.

2010 SEASON IN REVIEW



Venturing into the 2010 campaign with four upperclassmen prepared to lead the way, a foundation of talented and experienced youth and a standout recruiting class entering its initial year at Rocky Top, everything seemed ready to fall into place and provide the Tennessee softball program with a "Window of Opportunity" to climb back to its now-expected place among the nation's elite. After two straight campaigns had ended prematurely in NCAA Regional title game defeats, no one, perhaps outside of the program itself, could have ever imagined how well the available pieces would eventually fit together to take the Lady Vol softball team on a magical ride that ended in the program's fourth top-three national finish over the last six years and a single victory from a highly sought after berth in the best-of-three Women's College World Series Championship Series. During the journey UT secured dramatic victories, ended high-profile winning streaks, kept its long skeins of 40-win seasons and NCAA berths rolling along, saw numerous players reap league, regional and national honors and secured valuable postseason and big-game experience for its youth that should prove beneficial for years to come.

The 2010 Tennessee offense proved to be one of the best in school history as the Big Orange hit .321 as a team, good enough for 14th in all of NCAA Division I, scored 6.4 runs per contest (.421) in the NCAA and posted the highest team on-base percentage (.421) and slugging percentages (.482) since way back in 1996 (the year prior to entering the Southeastern Conference). The Lady Vols tied a program mark with 19 triples, came up just one big fly short of equalling another school record by bashing 51 home runs, laced 79 doubles and swiped 123 bases. From a defensive standpoint the tradition of solid fielding continued as the Lady Vols registered a .974 fielding percentage to finish 13th in the nation.

Individually, Tennessee was guided by a number of award-winning performers during the 2010 campaign, including freshmen outfielders Raven Chavanne and Kat Dotson, rookie pitcher Ivy Renfro, junior outfielder Kelly Grieve, sophomore infielder Jessica Spigner and freshmen infielder Lauren Gibson.

On her way to Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-American, All-Southeast Region and All-SEC honors in 2010 as well as being chosen as a Top 25 Finalist for the USA Softball National Collegiate Player of the Year trophy, Chavanne hit a team-leading .455 overall with a squad-best 95 hits, 64 runs and 26 RBIs while swiping a UT-best 37 stolen bases. The Thousand Oaks, Calif., native was among the NCAA Division I batting average leaders all season long, finishing at No. 7 in the country, was No. 19 in the NCAA in runs per game (1.0) and 26th in stolen bases per game (.058). She guided the Lady Vol squad in multi-hit games in 2010 with 29, including a quartet of four-hit efforts, and even posted early-season strings of eight consecutive hits, reached over 22 straight plate appearances by hit, walk, error or fielder's choice and posted a UT-best 11-game hitting skein.

Dotson hit .391 overall with 19 multi-hit and 10 multi-RBI games, 54 runs scored, 37 RBIs and 29 stolen bases in garnering 2010 Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-American, All-Southeast Region and All-SEC accolades. The Savannah, Ga., standout led the UT squad during league action with a .413 average and 19 RBIs, enough to be named the SEC Co-Freshman of the Year. Dotson was also named USA Softball National Collegiate Player of the Week and SEC Player of the Week on March 30th after hitting .769 (10-for-13) overall against Kentucky and Ole Miss with a string of seven consecutive hits.

Renfro recorded a 31-6 mark with a 2.41 ERA and 235 strikeouts in 232.1 innings of work during her freshman season. For her efforts she earned Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-Southeast Region, All-SEC, SEC All-Freshman, All-SEC Tournament and All-WCWS accolades. The Jackson, Tenn., native became the only pitcher in UT history besides Monica Abbott to post 30 or more wins in a single season or win a game at the WCWS. She wrapped up her initial campaign rated 14th in all of NCAA Division I in pitching victories and fifth in saves (five). Renfro truly arrived on a national level live on ESPN during the opening match-up of the NCAA Ann Arbor Super Regional. The 6-0 right hander flirted with a no-hitter into the seventh inning against the powerful Wolverines before settling for a spectacular two-hit shutout (5-0). She also registered wins over ranked teams such as #11 Oklahoma (first career win), #16 Ohio State and #16 LSU during the year.

An inclusion on the preseason "Watch List" for the 2010 USA Softball National Player of the Year award, Grieve continued her impressive contributions at Rocky Top as a junior by hitting .373 with 59 runs, career-highs in doubles (12), homers (three) and RBIs (30) to go along with 26 stolen bases. During UT's magical run to its third-place national finish, Grieve hit .414 over nine NCAA Tournament contests, setting her career average in NCAA action at .429. The Asheville, N.C., product set the tone for the Lady Vols during the NCAA Super Regional opener at No. 2 Michigan by going 2-for-3 with three, two-out RBIs in UT's 5-0 rout. Grieve completed her third season in Knoxville ranked 11th all-time in UT history in batting average (.367), fifth in stolen bases (83) and triples (eight) and within striking distance of the Lady Vol career Top 10 in both hits (189) and runs scored (135).

Spigner reaped Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-Southeast Region accolades after hitting .350 with a team-best 14 doubles, 34 runs scored, eight home runs and a squad-high 58 RBIs. She led Tennessee with 17 multi-RBI efforts in addition to 14 multi-hit performances. The Santa Clarita, Calif., native even blasted her first career grand slam versus #11 Oklahoma and a three-run HR against #16 Ohio State, accounting for all of UT's scoring in both high-profile victories. Spigner also contributed in the circle, picking up a huge save in a 5-4 win over #9 Georgia and garnering the win over Austin Peay, 10-0 (5 inn.).

One of four Lady Vol newcomers to reap SEC All-Freshman honors in 2010, Gibson tallied a .297 batting average with 41 hits, six HR's and 39 RBIs. The Pasadena, Md., product made her first experience on the NCAA stage count by recording a UT-best .444 (4-for-9) mark at the WCWS, by blasting a two-run HR in her first NCAA Tournament at-bat in UT's 5-0 win over Ball State and by delivering the key ninth-inning double that started the game-winning rally versus Louisville (3-1, 9 inn.) during the Knoxville Regional title game. One of her 10 multi-RBI games occurred during a 3-2 upset of #15 Texas as the rookie hammered a two-run HR in the second frame to grant the Lady Vols an early lead.

The Lady Vol senior class of Tiffany Huff, Erin Webb and Nicole Kajitani provided valuable leadership that was crucial to Tennessee's success throughout the 2010 season. As the lone remaining Lady Vol with both NCAA Super Regional and WCWS experience from the run to a second-place finish back in 2007, the trio really made its presence felt once play reached the bright lights of the NCAA Tournament. Behind the plate Huff guided a young UT pitching staff through both hostile environments, such as the one faced in Ann Arbor, Mich., during Super Regionals, and in stressful situations under the bright lights at the WCWS. The Saugus, Calif., native also reached base 11 times during NCAA action, six by hit, blasted a HR in the regional romp over Virginia and scored three times, including twice in the 9-0 (5 inn.) rout of #3 Arizona in the WCWS opener. Kajitani knocked in four runs during NCAA action, but none bigger perhaps than her solo home run off Michigan's Nikki Nemitz during UT's 4-3 upset of the No. 2 Wolverines. Known for her postseason production throughout her Big Orange career, Webb stepped it up even another level as a senior, hitting .318 with NCAA team-highs in homers (three) and RBIs (eight). The Hemet, Calif., product blasted a pair of HR's during the super regional-clinching win at #2 Michigan, knocked in two runs in the WCWS lid-lifter against #3 Arizona and crushed a tone-setting grand slam in UT's 7-5 victory over #9 Georgia.

Starting the season rated No. 16 in the initial NFCA poll of the year, the Big Orange opened its campaign at Team USA legend Dot Richardson's inaugural NTC Division I Elite Invitational in Clermont, Fla.

The field was outstanding as the Lady Vols were slated to have match-ups versus No. 3 Michigan, Florida Atlantic, No. 6 UCLA, UCF and No. 10 Oklahoma. Unfortunately for Tennessee, "Mother Nature" decided that she wasn't quite ready for UT to begin its new campaign as rain washed out opening day action against both the nationally-ranked Wolverines and FAU.

When opening day finally dawned on Feb. 13th, the Lady Vols had high hopes entering play against No. 6 UCLA and UCF. Unfortunately, things didn't go as planned as the Big Orange dropped both contests to start the season 0-2 for the first time since 2003.

Against the eventual national champion Bruins, Tennessee managed just five hits while sophomore pitcher Cat Hosfield took the loss in the circle by allowing five earned runs on six hits over two innings. In relief Renfro didn't fare any better as the rookie permitted four earned tallies on five hits in her first four collegiate innings of work against the powerful UCLA offense. UT was also undone by an uncharacteristic three errors in the field in the 11-1 (6 inn.) defeat.

Later that evening the Lady Vols looked to be headed to their initial win of 2010, leading UCF 3-2 in the top of the seventh, but watched the Golden Knights post a quartet of one-out runs to post a 6-3, come-from-behind upset. Grieve led the Big Orange offensively by going 2-for-3 at the dish with a double and two RBIs, while Chavanne and Gibson each tallied their initial collegiate hits during the loss. Hosfield struck out a career-high 10 UCF batters but suffered the difficult loss to drop to 0-2.

Eager to get back on the playing field after the previous day's disappointment, Tennessee looked for a positive close to the event on a chilly Sunday against #10 Oklahoma and in a re-scheduled match-up versus #3 Michigan. Facing the Sooners and its standout freshman pitcher Keilani Ricketts, runs were at a premium as neither squad could tally after loading the bases during a scoreless second frame. The big blow for UT came in the third as Spigner delivered her first career grand slam on a bomb to deep center, making it 4-0, Lady Vols. OU managed a rally in the seventh, cutting the deficit to two runs before Ricketts got caught in a rundown between second and third to end the 4-2 Tennessee triumph. With the match-up in hand, the skies darkened once again and opened up cancelling a potential match-up versus the Wolverines for a second time during the weekend. Little did either team know then that a 2010 meeting would indeed happen, far down the road and with a WCWS berth on the line and ESPN cameras there to document the event.

After an arctic cold blast cancelled the slated home opener against Western Carolina (Feb. 15), Tennessee set its sights on a 10-day road trip that would take the Orange & White to Las Cruces, N.M., for the Troy Cox Classic and to the prestigious Cathedral City Classic in Cathedral City, Calif. UT may have been more dominant during an event in the past, but it would be hard not to argue that its stay at the Troy Cox Classic may have set the standard for the program in its 15-year history. Against a line-up of teams that included Weber State, Bradley, Cleveland State, St. Mary's and home-standing New Mexico State, Tennessee outscored its five opponents 66-15, hit .467 as a team, posted 11 doubles, four triples and seven home runs, swiped 12 bases and registered double-digits in each contest.

In the opener against WSU with winds gusting at 30-40 mph, rain threatening and temps in the 40's, UT exploded for 21 runs over the first three innings on the way to a 21-2 (5 inn.) rout. Chavanne

came up just a double short of hitting for the cycle by going a perfect 4-for-4 at the plate with a triple, a grand slam (her first collegiate HR) and a career-best six RBIs Huff was 3-for-3 at the dish with a three-run bomb and four RBIs, while sophomore shortstop Ashley Andrews knocked in a career-high three tallies as part of a 2-for-3, two-run scored performance. Sophomore Holly Baker, in only her fourth career collegiate at-bat, hammered her first HR, a two-run blast to center in the third inning. Hosfield (1-2) allowed one unearned run on three hits over three innings with four K's to pick up her first win of the 2010 campaign. Freshman reliever Andi Williamson entered the circle starting the fourth and permitted one run on three hits with a strikeout in her first appearance for UT.

Renfro secured a 12-2 (5 inn.) win in the nightcap over Bradley by permitting one run on two hits over three innings of work. Chavanne was 3-for-4 and at one point had posted seven consecutive hits during the day before a fielder's choice ended the streak. As a team Tennessee hit .585 combined against Weber State and Bradley, blasted four homers and slugged at a .981 clip, despite starting six freshmen in the line-up versus BU.

After pounding out 10 hits in holding off Cleveland State 12-8, UT wrapped up its Sunday at the Troy Cox Classic by drilling St. Mary's, 11-2 (5 inn.) to advance on to the title contest. For her four-game efforts of hitting 13-of-16 at the plate (.813), Chavanne was awarded SEC Player of the Week accolades for the first time in her brief career. Dotson posted a 2-for-3 mark with a trio of runs-batted-in against St. Mary's to complete her weekend at .692 (9-for-13) overall with a team-best 10 RBIs. Sophomore catcher Shelby Burchell blasted her initial home run of the season, a solo shot, and knocked in two tallies while Andrews hammered a two-run blast in the third inning, marking her second big fly of the early campaign. Rookie second baseman Melissa Brown also delivered a 2-for-3 performance with three runs plated against St. Mary's to help back Renfro's complete game effort to improve to a perfect 3-0.

Waiting for the Lady Vols in Tuesday's championship contest were the power-hitting host New Mexico State Aggies. With Hosfield (3-2) controlling any NMSU threat from the circle by tossing a four-hitter, UT jumped on the hosts for three runs in the second and a six-spot in the third in cruising to a dominating, 10-1 (5 inn.) triumph. Chavanne finished out what amounted to a perfect weekend at the plate by posting her third 4-for-4 game at the event to go along with three RBIs. She ended up going 17-of-20 overall for a staggering .850 batting average and singled to lead off all five of UT's match-ups during the tourney. She also reached base safely all 20 times she stepped into the batter's box, 17 times by hit, twice via error and once on a fielder's choice and tied for the team lead with 10 RBIs while raising her average to .621 for the year. In her first game since returning from an illness, Spigner appeared better, registering a perfect 3-for-3 night with a triple, a homer and three RBIs while ending up just a double short of hitting for the cycle.

From there it was on to the Palm Springs, Calif., area where the level of competition again took a step up as match-ups awaited against troublesome Pacific and Syracuse as well as #10 Stanford and #16 Ohio State. The good vibes from New Mexico ended in the opener at the Cathedral City Classic as Pacific managed a grand slam off Hosfield in the third inning and withstood a late rally attempt by the Lady Vols to pull the 4-3 upset. Later that night Tennessee fell behind the nationally-ranked Cardinal, 6-1, in the fourth frame as standouts Alissa Haber and Ashley Hansen combined for three home runs. UT wouldn't go down without a fight, however, as Grieve's first career HR kicked-off a five-run fifth as UT rallied to nab a 7-6 lead. Unfortunately, Stanford scored a single run in both the sixth and seventh innings, including on a bases-loaded walk in the final frame, to post an 8-7 triumph. With that the Lady Vols fell to 6-4 on the season and 1-2 against ranked squads.

At perhaps another crossroads for the young Lady Vol team during the early season, Tennessee played a nearly three-hour marathon on Feb. 26th, before holding off a game Syracuse squad in an 8-6 thriller. Over 330 pitches were thrown by the two teams combined and Andrews saved the game in the bottom of the seventh by making a leaping catch at short with the bags packed and UT clinging to a two-run advantage. The Big Orange had staked themselves to an 8-1 lead after two frames on the

benefit of six walks from Syracuse hurler Jenna Caira and RBI singles by Huff and Chavanne. The Orange wouldn't go away, however, putting up a two-spot in the third, one run in the fifth and two in the seventh before surprise hurler Spigner got the help from Andrews that ended things.

In the final contest at the Cathedral City Classic, Renfro (4.0 IP, six hits, four K's) and Hosfield (3.0 IP, no hits in relief) combined on a gem to make a three-run, first inning blast from Spigner stand up in downing #16 Ohio State, 3-0. Grieve and Dotson had set the stage for Spigner's heroics by drawing one-out walks in the initial frame off OSU hurler Lindsay Bodeker. With the victory Tennessee completed its marathon trip with a 7-2 record, while hitting .371 as a team, averaging just over nine runs per game, blasting 27 extra-base hits and swiping 18 bases. Chavanne was incredible on the jaunt, hitting .706 (24-for-34) on the way to being named the SEC Freshman of the Week on March 1, and joined Andrews in tying for the team-high on the trip with 11 RBIs. Dotson and Huff each contributed 10 RBIs, while Spigner knocked in eight runs.

After yet another weather postponement of the home opener as a match-up against Tennessee Tech was wiped out because of cold and winter precipitation, the 20th-ranked Lady Vols (8-4) finally got the year at Lee Softball Stadium started by playing host to the Tennessee Classic where they would battle Ohio, Illinois State and #13 Texas.

A three-hit shutout by Hosfield and 2-for-2 nights by both Chavanne and Dotson helped guide UT past Ohio on the event's opening Friday night, 6-0. The next day #13 Texas, with its high-profile freshman hurler Blaine Luna and an offense that had hit 30 HR's while racing to a 16-2 start, was stationed across the diamond in the visitor's dugout. The rookie Longhorn pitcher was as advertised, striking out a program single-game high 17 Lady Vols but coming out on the wrong end of a 3-2 decision to the Big Orange. Gibson was the offensive star for Tennessee, blasting her first career dinger, a two-run shot in the second, while Chavanne led off the seventh with a double that turned into the winning run via a wild pitch. Hosfield picked up the win to improve to 6-3 on the year by firing a hitless seventh frame in relief. The 'Horns had tied the game in the final inning off Renfro (6.0 IP, five hits, two runs, five K's) with a two-run HR by Taylor Hoagland before Hosfield was summoned into to close the contest.

UT seemed to be locked in a bit of a malaise early on in its final contest on Saturday evening as Illinois State raced to a 4-1, third-inning advantage. Four round trippers, including a pair off the bat of Spigner, helped the Lady Vols rally past the Redbirds, 6-5. Huff went back-to-back with Spigner on big flies during UT's three-run fifth inning as part of her perfect 3-for-3 night. Webb (1-for-3) delivered her first HR of the year in the fifth, deadlocking the score at 4-4. Renfro picked up her fifth victory by tossing 3.2 frames in relief, allowing just two hits and posting four K's. Starter Hosfield worked 3.1 innings, eventually picking up her third save of the campaign.

Renfro tossed 6.2 innings and struck out a career-high nine to pick up her sixth win in a 5-1 victory over Ohio. Kajitani contributed back-to-back multi-RBI efforts on the final day of the Tennessee Classic, including her first HR of the season in an 8-4 victory over ISU. For her 0.81 ERA and 21 strikeouts over 17.1 innings of work, Renfro picked up her first league weekly honor by being chosen as the SEC Freshman of the Week (March 8).

At 13-4 overall the rugged SEC slate began as the Lady Vols headed to Starkville, Miss., to battle the Mississippi State Bulldogs over a rare, three-game mid-week series. After spotting MSU a quick 3-0 lead after one inning in the opener, UT banged out 12 hits in a comeback, 8-4 triumph. Dotson led the way by posting a 3-for-4 day at the plate with a triple and a team-best three RBIs. Spigner blasted her sixth home run of the year as part of a 2-for-2, two-RBI effort. Renfro improved to 7-1 during her initial campaign after allowing just one earned run on five hits with eight strikeouts over 5.0 innings of work in her first league match-up. Hosfield permitted three hits in two scoreless frames of relief to seal the victory.

The nightcap didn't work out as planned as the Orange & White rallied from another early three-run deficit to take a late lead before watching the home team push across a pair of runs during the last half of the seventh for a 5-4, walk-off victory. Hosfield took a tough defeat to drop to 7-4 overall, allowing three earned runs on eight hits over 5.2 innings of work with three walks and two K's. Renfro walked two and struck out one over two-thirds of a frame as both pitchers struggled with control.

Facing the series "rubber match," Tennessee wasted little time in jumping on the Bulldogs for 10 runs during the opening three innings on the way to a commanding 10-4 victory. Grieve led UT's 12-hit assault by going 4-for-5 at the plate with a double, four RBIs and three runs scored. Renfro was solid over a complete-game effort, allowing two earned runs on five hits to improve to 8-1 on the year.

Despite having its opening day cancelled by rain, UT opened its second and final home-hosted tourney of the season on March 13 against Tennessee Tech and Campbell. Neither proved much of a challenge as the Lady Vols made short work of both TTU, 11-2 (5 inn.), and the Camels, 9-0 (5 inn.). Grieve and Gibson each launched massive three-run HR's in the whitewash of Campbell, while Chavanne posted another perfect night at the plate (3-for-3) to improve her season average to .558.

Following a nine-K effort by Renfro and three-RBI performances from both Dotson and Spigner in a re-scheduled, 10-0 (5 inn.) rout of Liberty, the Lady Vols faced off against Campbell in a rematch of the previous day's finale. The second time around proved quite a bit more difficult as UT found itself on the wrong end of a 6-4 deficit. Having endured a 50-minute rain delay in the top of the fifth and with time running short, Tennessee desperately needed something to happen. During what would be a decisive sixth inning rally, Grieve and Dotson recorded infield singles and then Kajitani recorded an RBI to cut the gap to one run before Burchell was sent to the plate in a pinch hitting situation with the bags packed. The Columbia, Tenn., native absolutely crushed a pitch just inside the left field foul pole for her first career grand slam to guide the Lady Vols to a 9-6 win.

After blasting in-state foe Austin Peay, 10-0 (5 inn.) on March 17, behind the second straight four-RBI effort from Burchell, it was back into league play by welcoming in #9 Georgia to Lee Stadium for a huge SEC Eastern Division battle. In the series opener three RBIs from Gibson, including a two-run blast in the fourth, staked the Big Orange to a 5-1 lead venturing into the sixth. In what would become a theme to watch between the two squads throughout their five meetings in 2010, the Bulldogs would rally late. A solo HR by Alisa Goler and an RBI single by Laura Trout brought Georgia within 5-3 heading to the seventh. Megan Viggins opened UGA's final offensive opportunity with a solo blast to make it a one-run game with no one retired. Renfro entered in relief of Hosfield and immediately gave up a single forcing yet another call to the bullpen to bring in Spigner facing a daunting situation. Having beaten the Bulldogs in Athens in 2009, the Santa Clarita, Calif., native battled Goler over eight pitches before issuing a walk, placing Bulldogs on first and second with still no one retired. On an offering in the dirt, both base occupants took off attempting to advance. UGA pinch runner Macie Couey managed to get to third but overslid the bag as newly-entered Lady Vol third baseman Brown tagged her for a huge initial retirement. Brianna Hesson launched a high fly ball to left that was caught to get UT within one out of a big win. UGA's Kristyn Sandberg and her perfect 2-for-2 day stepped to the plate with the potential tying run in scoring position at second base. On a beautiful change-up, Spigner caught the hitter looking at strike three, ending the thrilling victory that marked the

300th all-time home victory for Tennessee.

Up 5-1 in the Saturday finale against #9 Georgia on the strength of HR's by Webb and Chavanne, UT watched in horror as the power-hitting Dawgs pushed eight runs across in the top of the sixth on the way to a 10-6 come-from-behind win. The series finale followed virtually the same script as a 6-1 lead evaporated for Tennessee over the sixth and seventh frames before a solo HR by Ashley Pauly in the eighth sealed UGA's series-clinching, 7-6 (8 inn.) triumph. A crucial error on the UT infield on a potential double-play ball in the seventh opened the door for Georgia to force the extra frame.

The losing streak appeared as if it might reach a season-long three games in the opener of the March 23rd DH against Kentucky in Knoxville. With UK in front 2-0, Gibson delivered a sac fly in the fifth and Dotson singled in a run during the sixth to tie it at 2-2. With Kentucky starter Chanda Bell and UT reliever Renfro battling into extra innings, UK got the upper hand as All-American shortstop Molly Johnson opened the top of the 10th with a solo HR just over the right field wall. In desperate need of a run to extend the contest, Kajitani started UT's half of the 10th by drawing a walk. Andrews dropped a potential sac bunt back to the circle, but it was bobbled for a crucial error to put two Lady Vols on with no outs. Chavanne slapped a ball to second that Bell corralled but her throw to first was wide, packing the bags full of Lady Vols. Grieve launched a fly ball to left for a sac that was plenty deep enough to plate Kajitani, tying the score and advancing the runners to second and third with one down. Dotson came to the dish with the chance to end things and came through with a clutch RBI single into short right center.

The nightcap wasn't as dramatic as a strong combined pitching effort from Renfro and Hosfield and a 4-for-4, three-RBI effort by Dotson, who hit .875 for the day versus the 'Cats, sealed a 7-1 triumph for No. 17 Tennessee (23-7, 5-3 SEC).

In an error-marred contest that saw the two squads combine for seven errors, the Lady Vols got a two-hitter from Renfro in taking the opener of a doubleheader from Ole Miss, 4-2, on March 27th. Five runs combined over the fifth and sixth innings helped secure a sweep as Tennessee downed Ole Miss 6-3 in the finale. Hosfield improved to 10-4 by allowing just one earned tally over six frames of work, while Renfro tossed a perfect seventh in earning her initial career save. Chavanne was 1-for-3 at the plate, drew a bases loaded walk to grant Tennessee the lead in the sixth and scored a team-best two runs in the contest. The series finale on Sun., March 28th, against the Rebels was washed out as inclement weather affected yet another Lady Vol contest. For their efforts against Kentucky and Ole Miss, Dotson and Renfro secured SEC Player and Pitcher of the Week for March 29th, respectively. Dotson also reaped USA Softball National Player of the Week accolades after hitting .769 overall over the four contests with six RBIs and a streak of seven consecutive hits. Renfro posted a 3-0 mark from the circle with a 0.82 ERA and her first career save.

Following a brief step outside of the league to rout in-state foe Middle Tennessee, 9-1 (5 inn.), on the final day of March, the Lady Vols traveled to Columbia, S.C., for a three-game set against the much-maligned South Carolina Gamecocks. Entering the series at 10-23 overall and 0-13 in SEC, USC was perhaps the most dangerous of foes, one with nothing to lose. Behind a three-hitter by Renfro (16-2) and three RBIs from Gibson, UT swept past the Gamecocks in the series opener on Friday, 9-1 (5 inn.).

With the Easter holiday having altered the schedule the two teams took the field for a doubleheader on a hot Saturday afternoon at Beckham Field. Webb and Huff knocked in single runs in the second and third as UT grabbed a 2-0 advantage in the day's opener. S.C. would rally, however, putting up an unearned tally against Hosfield in the fourth and threatening with a pair of runners aboard in the fifth and sixth frames. Strikeouts ended those rallies and Tennessee eventually added an insurance run on a Gibson single through the left side in the seventh in winning 3-1. The finale was all Big Orange as Huff led the charge with three RBIs and Renfro fired a complete-game three-hitter as the Lady Vols swept, 8-0 (5 inn.).

Prior to a mid-week doubleheader against Western Carolina, UT learned that Chavanne had made the cut as one of 25 national finalists for the USA Softball National Collegiate Player of the Year trophy, the softball equivalent of the Heisman Trophy. The Orange & White celebrated the news by drilling WCU, 14-0 (5 inn.) and 11-0 (5 inn.). Gibson led the way offensively by combining to go 4-for-4 over the two match-ups with five RBIs while just missing hitting for the cycle in the finale (single, double & triple).

The season next turned toward "The Plains" of Auburn, a place that hadn't been kind to the Lady Vols over the years (7-9 record). The series lid-lifter on April 10th set the tone right away as neither offense could get much going. Each team pushed across a single run in the fourth before Tiger second baseman Kelsey Cartwright delivered a walk-off HR to christen the seventh as Auburn prevailed, 2-1.

UT's attack continued to struggle into the day's second match-up, trailing 1-0 in the top of the sixth. That when sparkplug Grieve came through with a double to right center to open the sixth. Dotson stepped into the box next and absolutely crushed a two-run homer to deep right, her third big fly of the season, to give the Big Orange its first lead of the game at 2-1. From there, despite allowing a pair of base runners in the bottom of the seventh, Renfro finished off her third save of the year. Hosfield improved to 13-5 overall by allowing one unearned run on four hits over five frames of work.

With a regional TV audience tuned in the Lady Vols fell behind the Tigers 2-0 in the series finale before Kajitani drew them even with a two-run blast in the fourth. Dotson followed with a two-RBI base knock in the fifth as Tennessee rallied for a 5-3 series clinching victory. The win marked UT's first series triumph on "The Plains" since 1997 and improved the squad to 33-8 overall and 12-4 in SEC play. Renfro moved to 9-1 in league action and 19-2 overall by working 6.1 innings over two separate stints from the circle.

The road trip league success continued on April 14th at Arkansas' new Bogle Park as Tennessee swept the Razorbacks, 3-1 and 5-3. Chavanne and Dotson each delivered three hits apiece in the opener, while a four-run first in the finale, keyed by two RBIs from Burchell and an RBI single by Webb proved just enough to hold off a late UA rally. The 'Backs managed to bring the tying run to the plate in the bottom of the seventh but had Renfro force Courtney Breault to line out harmlessly to second on a 3-2 pitch to complete the UT triumph.

With weather having wreaked havoc on the Tennessee schedule, the coaches made the decision to bring in Presbyterian for a previously unscheduled DH on April 17th. The Lady Vols were up to the task, bombing the Blue Hose in back-to-back 9-1, run-rust contests. Spigner and Kajitani each recorded three RBIs in the opener while the former blasted a three-run bomb in the finale, her team-best eighth big fly of the season.

In a rematch against Tennessee Tech, this time in Cookeville, Tenn., Huff went deep twice (her fourth and fifth HR's) and Gibson hit a three-run shot (her fifth) as UT rolled past the Golden Eagles, 10-0 (6 inn.). UT exploded for five runs in the first with the big shot coming on Huff's first HR and added a two-spot in the fourth and three runs in the sixth. Renfro struck out a career-high 10 batters during a complete-game effort in improving to 23-2.

Following the brief respite from league play, Tennessee jumped back in with a vengeance by welcoming in #4 Florida for a three-game set. A four-run first inning proved plenty for the Gators in the opener as Stephanie Brombacher limited the Lady Vol offense to four hits in a 6-0 win. In taking the defeat, Renfro was saddled with a loss for the first time since falling to Georgia on March 21, just over a full

2010 SEASON IN REVIEW



Friday's night's DH finale proved more competitive as the back-and-forth affair went right down to the final pitch before UT prevailed, 4-3. RBIs from Kajitani and Gibson had staked the Big Orange to a 2-1 lead heading into the top of the seventh. That's when the experienced Gators pulled out a two-run rally, sealed with a two-out, two-RBI bloop to left by Corrie Brooks to give UF a 3-2 lead. Grieve refused to let the Lady Vols lose, however, hustling down the line on a bounce to first. The Asheville, N.C., native slid in just before the tag to record a vital lead-off single against the reliever Brombacher in the seventh. Dotson followed with a four-pitch walk and then Spigner bounced a ball up the middle that was misplayed for a vital error, packing the bags full of Lady Vols. Huff stepped in and blasted a ball to center, allowing the opportunity for Grieve to attempt to score via a sac fly. She arrived at the plate at the same time as the ball and slid in just under Brittany Schutte's tag to knot the score at 3-3. Following a strikeout for the second retirement of the frame, it came down to the seniors Kajitani and Webb, and on their senior weekend, no less. Kajitani worked the count full before coaxing a key walk, loading the bases once again with Webb coming to the dish. It looked as if extra innings would perhaps be necessary as the Big Orange first baseman quickly found herself down 0-2 in the count. The Hemet, Calif., product refused to back down, however, fouling off pitch after pitch over a nine-pitch at-bat. Finally Brombacher missed outside for ball four and an Orange-clad mob raced from the dugout to the plate in celebration as Dotson scored the winning tally on a bases loaded free pass. The resulting roar of delight from the UT crowd of 1,374 was heard and reported about from Lindsay Nelson Baseball Stadium over on the Tennessee campus.

As had happened so often to the Lady Vols during the year, weather again played a role as rain washed out their series finale against the Gators on April 24th. It didn't seem to bother UT, however, as the Big Orange spent some time after the cancellation entertaining themselves and those in attendance by sliding on the tarp competing in what the coaches termed "The Tarp-Sliding Olympics."

The regular season continued in Tuscaloosa, Ala., in a series against the #4 Alabama Crimson Tide. Despite out-hitting UA in the series opener, 7-6, UT left nine runners on base in dropping a 4-2 decision. Grieve led the Lady Vol offense with a 2-for-4 effort at the dish, while Huff was credited with UT's lone RBI on a sixth-inning double.

Bama roared to a 7-0 lead and appeared ready to close out Saturday's DH via the run-rule. Tennessee had other ideas, however, as a Gibson RBI double in the sixth and a five-run seventh, highlighted by two-run homers by Grieve and Huff, almost brought UT back in a 7-6 loss live on ESPN. Renfro dropped to 23-4 on the season after allowing seven runs in 2.2 frames, before Hosfield came on in relief and fired 3.1 hitless innings to keep UT alive. In perhaps the least surprising event in UT's 2010 campaign, the series finale was cancelled by rain. That set the Orange & White's record at 39-11 overall and 15-7 in SEC play.

The final series of the regular season brought #16 LSU to Lee Stadium for an important league series against the Tigers. UT got things off to a terrific start in the program's 1000th all-time contest, utilizing multiple RBIs from both Burchell and Andrews, a perfect sac squeeze from "Senior Day" honoree Huff and some clutch pitching by Renfro in the seventh to kill off a Bayou Bengal rally, 6-5. The day's second contest went LSU's way as freshman hurler Rachele Fico scattered six UT hits in a 3-0 Tiger win.

A four-run fourth inning proved more than enough for Tennessee in the series "rubber match" as Renfro fired a three-hitter to prevail 6-1. Brown posted two hits in three at-bats with an RBI double. Spigner was 1-for-1 with her team-best 11th double of the season and two RBIs and Grieve also delivered a two-bagger (her ninth of 2010) during her 1-for-2 run, RBI, stolen base performance.

With the regular season campaign in the books and UT boasting a 41-12 overall record, the Lady Vols entered the annual SEC Tournament in Fayetteville, Ark., as the #5 seed. That brought a meeting with old rival and fourth-seeded Georgia in the opening round. Renfro picked up victory number 26 of the year and UT scored in each of the first four innings in a 6-4 triumph. The speed game was especially outstanding versus UGA as Grieve went 3-for-4 at the plate with a double and two runs scored and Chavanne blasted a two-run HR (her third of the year) while going 1-for-2 with two RBIs, two runs scored and a pair of stolen bases. Spigner knocked in a tally and made an incredible catch while falling head-over-heels into the UGA dugout.

No. 15 Tennessee (42-13) battled hard in the SEC semifinals against regular season champion and No. 3-ranked Alabama, scoring twice in the fifth inning to climb out of a two-run hole to tie things at 3-3. The Tide's Whitney Larsen blasted a walk-off solo homer in the bottom of the seventh, however, to secure a 4-3 win. That eliminated the Lady Vols from the league's annual event and forced the squad to wait for the announcement of its NCAA Tournament fate on the NCAA Selection Show.

When the bracket was finally released on May 16th, Tennessee received the No. 15 national seed and learned it would be hosting NCAA Regional action for the sixth consecutive season. The Big Orange welcomed in three squads to Lee Softball Stadium over May 21-23 in the form of Mid-American Conference (MAC) Tournament champion Ball State, Virginia, the second place team out of the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the BIG EAST's third-place squad Louisville.

UT opened what would become a magical tourney run with a 5-0 win over Ball State. A two-run homer from Gibson (her sixth) was the big blow, backing a four-hit, complete-game shutout by Renfro. Tennessee banged out a program NCAA Tournament single-game record 15 hits and 11 runs during an 11-2 rout on May 22nd that eliminated Virginia from the event. Three different Lady Vols posted a pair of RBIs during the contest as Chavanne posted a 4-for-5 effort at the plate, Grieve went 3-for-5 with a double and Spigner recorded a 2-for-5 effort. In two separate stints from the circle, Renfro fired 5.1 scoreless innings in improving to 28-4 on the campaign.

That meant that Louisville was what separated the Big Orange from its first trip to NCAA Super Regionals since 2007. It wouldn't prove an easy contest as the Cardinals took UT to extra innings before succumbing, 3-1 (9 inn.). Heroines were in abundance for UT on a Sunday that frustrated Tennessee to the tune of 16 runners left on base. Included among that group were Spigner, who knocked in the game-tying run on a fifth-inn. double, Hosfield, who allowed just one run on four hits over eight innings while improving to 16-8 on the year, Grieve (2-for-4, stolen base, run), the fireplug whose hustle play on a single to left started the huge two-out, game-tying rally in the fifth and Gibson (1-for-5), whose lone hit of the match-up was a lead-off double that eventually became the winning tally in the decisive ninth. Also contributing as per usual to Tennessee's 12-hit offensive assault were Dotson (3-for-5) and Chavanne (2-for-6), as the duo combined for nearly half of UT's total hit output. Renfro was summoned into the contest starting the ninth and worked a perfect frame to pick up the fourth save of her career.

Standing in the way of a potential trip to the WCWS was No. 2 Michigan, a power-hitting force that owned a 36-game home winning streak at the Wilpon Softball Complex in Ann Arbor, Mich. Not many of the in-the-know softball pundits gave the Big Orange much of a chance against the senior-laden Wolverines. UT had been in plenty of battles down the stretch in the SEC, however, and would prove the nation wrong once the supers began. Both programs possessed quite an NCAA Tournament history versus the other. UM and the Lady Vols battled twice in 2005 at the Women's College World Series on the way to the Maize & Blue's eventual national title, while Tennessee downed Michigan two

games-to-one during the NCAA Knoxville Super Regional in 2006 on the road to a third place finish at the WCWS. And recall that UT and UM were supposed to meet at the season-opening NTC Division I Elite Invitational before weather got involved and cancelled the match-up twice in three days.

Right from the outset of the best-of-three series on May 27th, despite a hostile crowd of over 2,000 Maize & Blue backers and a pep band blasting "Hail to the Victors," the Lady Vols showed few nerves. After a quiet opening two frames that saw Renfro and UM's Jordan Taylor dueling from the circle, Burchell posted the first hit of the game for either squad by taking a change-up into center field for a single leading off the third. That got a big scoring rally started as Webb reached on a sac bunt attempt back to the circle, placing a pair of Lady Vols on base with one out. Andrews stepped into the box and hit a ball sharply to UM third baseman Maggie Viehhaus that rolled straight through the fielder's legs as freshman pinch runner Leah Taylor scored and Webb and Andrews ended up standing at third and second, respectively. After two quick outs, Grieve stepped up in yet another huge spot, ripping a pitch into right center for a two-RBI single and all of a sudden it was 3-0 and the large Michigan crowd was almost in stunned silence.

The fireworks got started again for Tennessee with one out in the top of the fifth. Andrews managed a walk against Taylor and that got the Big Orange offense off and running again as the speed game came to the plate looking to wreak havoc. Chavanne followed with a single, placing two on base. Following a Lady Vol K, Grieve delivered again on an RBI base knock to left field, advancing to second as the ball was bobbled for an error. With two UT runners in scoring position, Michigan's Taylor was called for an illegal pitch, forcing in a run to make the score 5-0.

From there it was simply left to watch Renfro and see if she could do the unthinkable and fire a no-hitter against a dangerous Wolverine line-up. UM managed a base runner in scoring position via an infield miscue by Tennessee leading off the top of the sixth, but couldn't get anything going as the Lady Vol hurler struck out two more members of the Maize & Blue. Royce St. Clair fled out to right field opening the bottom of the seventh to push Renfro's total to 6.1 no-hit frames. Dorian Shaw stepped into the box and finally broke up the no-no with a single that snuck just inside the third base line. Second baseman Amanda Chidester delivered a swinging bunt out in front of the plate for a base knock and suddenly the home crowd had something to cheer about. Renfro rebounded quickly though forcing Nikki Nemitz to pop-up to UT sophomore Holly Baker in foul ground in left and got Steph Kirkpatrick to bounce routinely to first, completing the stunning two-hit shutout and ending UM's two-year-long home streak.

The next afternoon with ESPN cameras again broadcasting live, UT attempted to close out the Wolverines before a game three would become necessary. A full house of 2,479 watched in shock as Tennessee utilized the long ball via a pair of home runs by Webb and a solo blast by Kajitani in racing to a 4-0 lead through four innings. The Michigan bats finally came to life after being shut down by Hosfield as Angela Findlay got the Maize & Blue on the board with a two-run blast. The previous day's heroine, Renfro, entered in relief and despite allowing a solo shot to Shaw in the sixth, kept UT in front heading to the final inning.

With one final chance in the top of the seventh, Michigan's Kirkpatrick managed to draw a lead-off walk and suddenly the Wolverines had offensive life. Renfro recorded a huge first out on a swinging strikeout of Amy Knapp. UM's Molly Bausher kept the rally going with a clean single, bringing the middle of the order up with a chance to tie or give Michigan a lead. Findlay came through with a base knock to center, but the threat of Grieve's strong throwing arm in center forced UM coach Carol Hutchins to hold the potential tying runner at third. That proved a huge play as Maggie Viehhaus struck out to get UT within one retirement of advancing to Oklahoma City. St. Clair stepped into the batter's box and ripped a liner that caused Lady Vol hearts to skip a beat. Andrews was positioned perfectly, however, catching the shot and leaping into the air as her teammates raced on the field and joined in the Big Orange celebration.

In heading to the WCWS for the fourth time in six years and for the first time since coming oh so close to winning a title in 2007, Tennessee managed to draw its old nemesis #3 Arizona in its opener. The two squads had met seven times previously at the ASA Hall of Fame Stadium in Oklahoma City with UT holding a 4-3 advantage, but the 'Cats having managed to win the decisive games facing elimination or with a title on the line. This time around the Big Orange wasn't playing around, having entered the WCWS on a five-game NCAA winning streak. The Lady Vols crushed the Wildcats, 9-0 (5 inn.), as Webb and Spigner each doubled in two runs and Renfro continued her incredible postseason effort with a three-hit shutout.

And who was waiting in the winner's bracket, why #9 Georgia for a fifth meeting of 2010. And just like the other four match-ups the script proved to be exactly the same. Tennessee jumped to a big early lead (7-0 into the bottom of the fourth) before the Bulldogs attempted a furious rally late. Unlike two of the meetings in Knoxville during the regular season when UGA came all the way back, however, the hole proved too much as Renfro retired the potential game-tying Bulldog batter twice in the final frame of a 7-5 win. The biggest blow of the contest came off the bat of Webb who drilled a grand slam to right center in the third, her third HR and second grand slam of the season against the 'Dawgs.

After a much-needed day off with daytime temperatures climbing as high as 105 degrees, standing in the way, once the dust settled, of a Tennessee berth in the best-of-three WCWS Championship Series was #3 Arizona.

In front of 6,838 fans on June 6th, the 'Cats forced the "if necessary" game with an 8-0 (5 inn.) rout of the Lady Vols. Renfro took the defeat to fall to 31-5 overall, allowing three earned runs on four hits with a walk and five strikeouts over 2.2 innings of work. Hosfield permitted five earned tallies on five hits with four free passes and a K in 2.1 frames. Tennessee's offense was limited to just two hits by a combination of Arizona hurlers Kenzie Fowler and Sarah Akamine. Huff and Brown each delivered singles during the bottom of the fifth inning for the Big Orange.

With one final chance to win a berth to play for a national title, Tennessee managed to hold a 2-0 lead into the bottom of the third before eventually succumbing to #3 Arizona, 5-2. A bases-loaded walk by Gibson in the first and a Huff RBI double in the third staked UT to its advantage. A lead-off single by UA's Lauren Schutler came back to haunt Renfro in the third as clean-up hitter Stacie Chambers tied the game in a HR down the left field line. Bridgette Del Ponte singled in a run in the fifth and Brittany Arredondo blasted a two-run shot to right in the sixth to finalize the scoring. The Lady Vols got base runners aboard in the final three innings but couldn't string together a rally against the freshman hurler Fowler, eventually settled for its fourth top three national finish at the WCWS in the last six seasons.

Entering the 2010 campaign the pieces looked to be in place to potentially take advantage of a "Window of Opportunity." Little did anyone know before the season began how well such a young team would mesh together, how the schedule and postseason draw would play out, or whether it was even possible for a squad that boasted only four upperclassmen to reach the WCWS. By the end of a magical ride that included 49 victories, the softball world had its answer. Tennessee was indeed ready to regain its now expected position among the nation's elite.



During 2010 freshman pitcher Ivy Renfro became the only Lady Vol hurler other than Monica Abbott to win 30 or more games in a single season or post a victory at the Women's College World Series. The Jackson, Tenn., product posted a 31-6 record, a 2.41 ERA and 235 strikeouts in 232.1 innings while earning Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-Southeast Region and All-SEC honors. 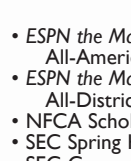

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

"The Standard For Excellence"



The SEC has won consecutive national championships in baseball and football. Since 1990, the SEC has won 135 national team championships for an average of more than six per year.

Alabama won the SEC's first national title of the year with its win in the BCS National Championship Game in football. It is the SEC's fourth consecutive football national title. Florida captured its second women's swimming and diving national championship. Florida also won its first ever championship in men's indoor track and field. South Carolina won the national championship in the sport of baseball. Florida finished first among Southeastern Conference schools and second overall in the Director's Cup final standings.

Overall, the SEC finished in the top two in nine of its 20 sponsored sports and in the top five in 14 of the 20 sports. Ten SEC teams participated in football postseason bowls with Alabama, Florida, Ole Miss, Arkansas, Auburn and Georgia winning the BCS National Title Game, Sugar, Cotton, Liberty, Outback, and Independence bowls, respectively. Four men's basketball teams were invited to the NCAA Tournament and seven women's basketball teams were also invited to the NCAA Tournament. The SEC had a eight teams advance to postseason play in baseball hosting four regionals with South Carolina and Florida advancing to the College World Series. With 145 teams advancing to NCAA postseason competition, the SEC continued to solidify its place as the nation's premier conference.

In addition to the four team championships, 41 SEC student-athletes garnered individual national championships, while 440 individuals were awarded with First-Team All-American Honors. Student-athletes around the league continued to excel in the classroom as well with more than 2,300 earning recognition on the SEC Academic Honor Roll.

On the national all-sport level, 11 SEC schools placed in the top 60 of the NACDA Director's Cup rankings. Florida led the league with a second place finish. Tennessee placed 16th while LSU was 19th; Georgia finished 20th, Alabama 23rd, Auburn 26th, Kentucky 29th, South Carolina 41st, Arkansas 46th, Ole Miss 56th and Vanderbilt 59th to round out the league's top-60 finishes.

SOFTBALL IN THE SEC

SEC Softball will celebrate its 15th year of existence in 2011 and has established itself as one of the leading conferences in the sport.

The Southeastern Conference qualified seven teams for the 2010 NCAA Tournament - Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, LSU and Tennessee, as the conference made its 13th overall, and eighth consecutive, Women's College World Series appearance. For the third consecutive year, an SEC team received the No. 1 national seed, as the Alabama Crimson Tide coveted the honor in 2010. Overall, five teams earned national seeds: No. 1 Alabama, No. 4 Florida, No. 6 Georgia, No. 12 LSU and No. 15 Tennessee.

The SEC advanced three teams to Oklahoma City: Florida, Georgia and Tennessee while Georgia and Tennessee advanced to the semifinals.

Alabama won the 2010 conference crown as they posted a 23-4 SEC record, marking their second title in school history. It was quite the year for the Tide as they posted a 52-11 overall mark and swept league honors. Pat Murphy was named Coach of the Year while Kelsi Dunne earned Pitcher of the Year honors and Charlotte Morgan defended her Player of the Year title. Kayla Braud was named Co-Freshman of the Year along with LSU's Rachele Fico and Tennessee's Kat Dotson. Arkansas' Jessica Bachkora was selected as Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

Softball came under the auspices of the Southeastern Conference in the 1996-97 season. Since that time, 10 different conference teams have made appearances in the NCAA Championship, including six teams earning Women's College World Series berths - one by South Carolina in the inaugural season, Alabama in 2000, 2003, 2005, 2006, 2008, 2009, Florida in 2008, 2009 and 2010, Georgia in 2009 and 2010, LSU in 2001 and 2004 and Tennessee in 2005, 2006, 2007 and 2010.

Eight teams (Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State, South Carolina and Tennessee) have made Top 25 appearances and six teams have climbed into the Top 10 (Alabama, Florida, Georgia, LSU, South Carolina and Tennessee) of the NFCA/USA Today Poll. At least one SEC team has been ranked in the poll each week since the inception of SEC Softball.

South Carolina is the longest standing program in the league with a rich history of softball dating back 36 seasons. The Gamecocks have made 15 NCAA Regional and three Women's College World Series appearances.

Mississippi State played softball for five years during the 1980's before resuming the sport when it was added to the SEC. Tennessee added softball in 1995-96, one year before its inception in the league. Alabama, Arkansas, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, LSU and Ole Miss began softball programs in 1996-97 to give the league 11 representatives (Vanderbilt does not sponsor softball).

The 1999 season was the first in which the conference was eligible for an automatic berth to the NCAA Championships.

As the sport continues to grow in competitiveness and popularity, the SEC has had six different regular season champions and five different conference tournament champions.

THE TOURNAMENT: The NCAA will select 64 out of the over 260 schools which sponsor Division I softball to compete in the 2011 NCAA Tournament. NCAA Regionals will take place May 20-22 at campus sites to gain 16 berths into the Super Regional round from May 27-29. Eight Super Regional winners will advance to the Women's College World Series from June 2-8 at the ASA Don E. Porter Hall of Fame Stadium in Oklahoma City, Okla. The College World Series will be a double-elimination format with the two remaining squads facing off in a best-of-three format for the national championship.

THE NCAA FIELD: The champions of 30 NCAA Division I conferences will automatically qualify for the 2011 championship. The remaining 34 teams will be selected at-large based on upon win-loss record and strength of schedule. In addition, the committee will utilize the Ratings Percentage Index (RPI) as a tool to evaluate teams. Representatives from the America East, Atlantic-10, Atlantic Coast, Atlantic Sun, Big 12, BIG EAST, Big South, Big Ten, Big West, Colonial Athletic Association, Conference USA, Horizon League, Ivy League, Metro Atlantic Athletic, Mid-American, Mid-Eastern Athletic, Missouri Valley, Mountain West, Northeast, Ohio Valley, Pacific-10, Pacific Coast Softball, Patriot League, Southeastern, Southern, Southland, Southwestern Athletic, Summit League, Sun Belt and Western Athletic Conferences each qualify by winning their leagues.

UT AGAINST 2010 NCAA/RANKED TEAMS: The Lady Vols are guaranteed to play against 11 opponents during the 2011 campaign that competed in the last year's NCAA Tournament. Included in the Big Orange's rugged schedule are three of the eight participants from the 2010 Women's College World Series in Oklahoma City, Okla., defending national champion UCLA, Florida and Georgia. Tennessee will also contest games against seven members of the final 2010 USA TODAY/National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) poll.

TENNESSEE'S SEVENTH STRAIGHT VISIT TO NCAA'S: The 2010 Tennessee Lady Vol softball team secured the program's seventh consecutive trip to NCAA Regionals as the nation's No. 15 seed and advanced all the way to the WCWS. Hosting the regional round for the sixth straight season, UT swept three tough contests from Ball State (5-0), Virginia (11-2) and Louisville (3-1, 9 inn.) to advance to the NCAA Super Regionals for the fourth time in program history and the first time since 2007. Facing the Lady Vols was a best-of-three series versus No. 2 national seed Michigan at the Wilpon Softball Complex in Ann Arbor, Mich. The Wolverines entered the super regional round having won 36 consecutive home games. Tennessee would shock the softball nation, however, by sweeping a pair of contests from Michigan (5-0 and 4-3) to advance on to the Big Orange's fourth WCWS in the last six years. Once in Oklahoma City at the ASA Hall of Fame Stadium, the Lady Vols kept rolling, racing past eventual national finalist No. 3 Arizona via run-rule (9-0, 5 inn.) and outlasting Southeastern Conference Eastern Division rival No. 9 Georgia (7-5) to get within one victory of a berth in the best-of-three WCWS Championship Series. Arizona got its revenge on UT, however, eliminating Tennessee 8-0 (5 inn.) and 5-2 to end the Orange & White's magical run at 49-15 and third in the national rankings.

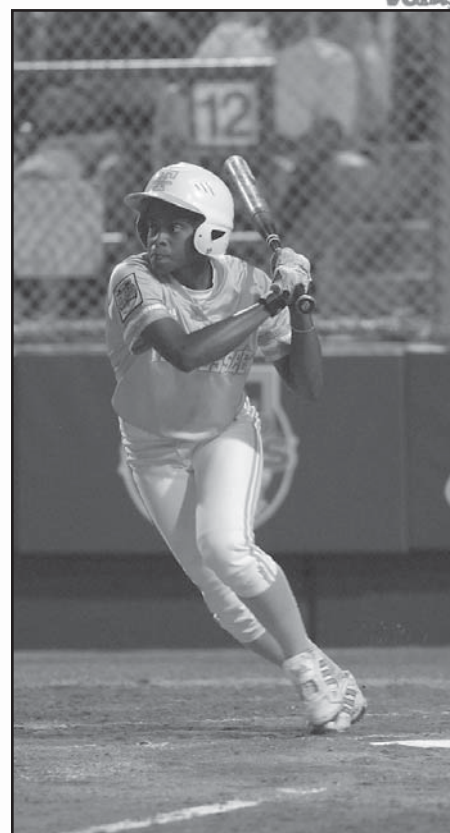

When the NCAA Selection Committee announced the 48-team field for the 1999 NCAA Softball Tournament, the Lady Vol softball squad heard the news it had been awaiting since the inception of its program in the fall of 1995. With a 44-25 overall record and a first-ever Southeastern Conference Eastern Division title on its resume, Jim Beitia's club earned an at-large bid to one of the eight, six-team regional sites.

As a third seed, Tennessee traveled to Seattle, Wash., for a first round meeting with number four seed Cal-State Fullerton. Host Washington, ranked sixth nationally, drew the top seed in the double-elimination event on its home field. While the Orange & White dropped both of its contests in the Pacific Northwest, the results failed to lessen the achievement of participating in the nation's premier event after recording the program's most successful campaign to date.

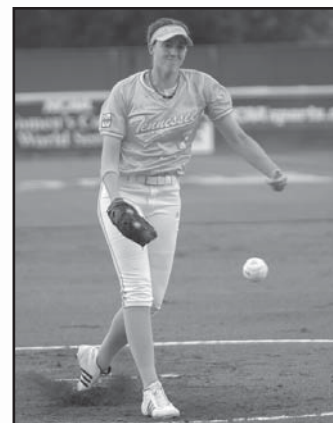

The Tennessee Lady Vol softball team received its fifth consecutive bid to the NCAA Field of 64 and played host to its fourth consecutive NCAA Regional in 2008. UT managed a 3-2 overall record in the event, being eliminated in the championship contest by eventual Women's College World Series participant Virginia Tech and its All-American hurler Angela Tincher by a 4-2 count.

The Big Orange rode a combined one-hit shutout from Megan Rhodes and Ashton Ward to a 3-0 victory over Winthrop in both teams' opener, marking UT's 10 straight NCAA Regional victory dating back to 2004. Va. Tech utilized 14 strikeouts from Tincher and a surprise grand slam from No. 9 hitter Caroline Stolle to race past Tennessee 4-0 and drop the Lady Vols into the loser's bracket. Forced into action again later that day, UT blew out Louisville, 8-1, as freshman Jen Lapicki blasted a homer and knocked in four runs.

With only two teams remaining with a chance at NCAA Super Regionals, Tennessee would have to beat Tech twice in the same day to advance. The Big Orange used the Erinn Webb power show to drop the Hokies 7-1 in the opener as the Hemet, Calif., native hammered two home runs in the triumph. Up 1-0 after three innings and in possession of the momentum, UT was undone by a 50-minute rain delay. Following the break, Tech responded with a four-run top of the fourth to eventually prevail 4-2 and send UT home early.

A 5-2 triumph over Nebraska on the strength of a clutch three-run, second-inning double by pinch hitter Ashton Ward sent the Big Orange through to face JSU for a place in NCAA Super Regionals.

Jacksonville State wasted little time in getting to UT for a pair of runs in the second frame and four more in the sixth on the way to a 6-1 victory to force a championship-deciding game. Despite jumping in front 1-0 during the opening inning on a sacrifice fly from junior catcher Tiffany Huff, Tennessee watched the Gamecocks rally for single tallies in the top of the fourth and fifth innings versus Pieroni to eventually prevail, 2-1, and advance through to the best-of-three Super Regionals.

Tennessee picked up the national No. 15 seeding and earned the right to host NCAA Regionals in Knoxville for the sixth straight season. UT swept its three match-ups to advance on to a best-of-three Super Regional for the first time since 2007.

In the opener versus Ball State, UT freshman pitcher Ivy Renfro tossed a four-hit shutout in her first NCAA Tournament action as the Lady Vols prevailed, 5-0. Rookie second baseman Lauren Gibson had the big blow at the plate with a tone-setting, two-run homer during the Lady Vols' three-run first inning.

The Big Orange set numerous NCAA program records, including those for most single-game runs, hits and RBIs, in an 11-2 rout of Virginia to advance to the Knoxville Regional title tilt for the sixth consecutive campaign. Freshman left fielder Raven Chavanne equaled a program NCAA mark with four hits as part of a 4-for-5, two-RBI effort, while junior center fielder Kelly Grieve went 3-for-5 with a double and two RBIs and sophomore third baseman Jessica Spigner was 2-for-5 with two RBIs.

Between Tennessee and its fourth all-time berth in the NCAA Super Regionals was Louisville, making its third trip to Knoxville for NCAA's after previous visits in 2006 & 2008. UL struck first on a HR by clean-up hitter Chelsea Bemis in the second inning. A two-out single by Grieve and an RBI double off the bat of Spigner tied the score at 1-1 in the fifth. With regulation play not enough, the match-up progressed to the ninth frame where a lead-off double by Gibson started a two-run UT outburst. Sophomore pitcher Cat Hosfield, who had fired eight innings of four-hit ball, gave way to Renfro in the circle. The 6-0 right hander worked a perfect ninth for the save as UT advanced on to super regionals.

The powerful Wolverines entered the best-of three series having won 36 consecutive games at the Wilpon Softball Complex in Ann Arbor, Mich., dating back to the 2009 season.

Right from the start in the series opener, UT freshman pitcher Ivy Renfro took control from the circle, carrying a no-hitter into the seventh inning in an eventual 5-0 upset of the Maize & Blue. Junior center fielder Kelly Grieve proved the heroine at the plate by contributing three, two-out RBIs during the shocking Big Orange victory.

Former Tennessee LadyVol pitcher Monica Abbott was selected to represent her country as part of the prestigious United States Softball Team at the 2008 Olympics in Beijing, the People's Republic of China. During her stay at the international competition, the Salinas, Calif., native performed superbly from the circle in helping guide Team USA to a silver medal. Her stat line was staggering: a squad-best 3-0 record, a 0.29 ERA, 32 strikeouts in just 24 innings of work while allowing the opposition to hit at just a .076 clip. The 6-3 lefthander also became the first American pitcher in Olympic history to fire a perfect game by blanking the Netherlands. Unfortunately a shocking defeat in the championship game to world power Japan cost Team USA the gold, but Abbott made the most of the experience. The pageantry of the opening and closing ceremonies, the Olympic Village, visiting with athletes from all over the world, the heart-pounding competition. In her own words, it was something she will never forget.

Abbott made her triumphant homecoming to Lee Softball Stadium and the University of Tennessee in front of a packed house of 1,622 fans on April 12, 2008, as the hurler and the U.S. Olympic Softball Team defeated the Lady Vols, 4-2. The 6-3 lefthander fired a complete game two-hitter with 11 strikeouts. Her former team did manage a pair of solo homers to nab a 2-0 lead and led the prestigious squad into the fifth inning before succumbing.

The University of Tennessee

Founded as Blount College in 1794, the University of Tennessee became the state's first public university and its comprehensive land-grant research institution in 1879. Tennessee's only public Carnegie Doctoral/Research-Extensive University, UT ranked 51st among *U.S. News and World Report's* Top Public Universities in the country.

The University's colleges and schools offer more than 300 degree programs to its 27,101 students, who come from every county in Tennessee, every state in the nation and more than 100 foreign countries. Females account for 51 percent of the student body and the university has a 14.2 percent total minority enrollment.

Knoxville

When Tennessee became a state on June 1, 1796, Knoxville was distinguished as its first capital. The capital has since moved to Nashville, but the Blount Mansion and James White's Fort still stand as gentle reminders of Knoxville's historic past.

The city of Knoxville has grown into a cosmopolitan area with numerous attractions and more than 500 restaurants. It serves as the headquarters to the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA), the nation's largest public utility, and is known as a technology corridor of the Southeast.

Knoxville is located in the geographical center of the eastern United States and is within a day's drive of half of the nation's population. Knox County is situated at the crossroads of three major interstates, I-75, I-40 and I-81.

Knoxville's city population is 177,661 with a metropolitan area population of approximately 704,431, which includes Knox, Anderson, Blount, Loudon, Sevier and Union counties.

HISTORY OF LADY VOL ATHLETICS

Though female athletes have competed at UT since 1903, they have been managed by a separate administration only since 1976. For over 30 years, athletics for women at Tennessee have enjoyed an enormous amount of growth and success. The department has been a model for other women's programs across the country because of its competitive teams, outstanding facilities, quality staff members and excellent graduation rates among student-athletes.

Intercollegiate athletics for women at the University of Tennessee officially began during the 1976-77 academic year. The UT women's department had nine intercollegiate sports at that time, including basketball, cross country, field hockey, gymnastics, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball. In the inaugural year, the staff numbered 17 and a budget of \$120,000 serviced approximately 75 athletes.

Despite the fact that field hockey and gymnastics are no longer a part of the department, growth in staff, budget and sports continually increased through the 1970s and into the 21st century. Under current athletics director Joan Cronan, nearly 115 staff members are on hand to support 227 student-athletes. Cronan directs a department that posts an operating budget of nearly \$16.5 million.

With the passage of the Restoration Act of 1988, the original mandates of Title IX have been met at Tennessee with the annexation of four sports. Golf was the first added to UT's plate in 1992. Rowing and softball joined the family during the 1995-96 season, and soccer, the 11th women's intercollegiate sport at Tennessee, began play in the fall of 1996.

The 2009-10 academic and athletic campaigns for the University of Tennessee Lady Volunteers culminated with 127 student-athletes earning academic honors (an amazing 56 percent) while the Orange and White teams placed third in the Southeastern Conference All-Sports Trophy standings. In the field of competition, the overall winning percentage for all LadyVol teams during the 2009-10 season was a stellar 70.3 percent. A total of 11 Tennessee student-athletes earned All-American citations.

UT claimed the SEC regular season and tournament championships in basketball. The softball team finished third at the Women's College World Series, missing the Championship series by one game. Phoebe Wright captured NCAA titles in the indoor and outdoor 800m and was a member of the NCAA Indoor DMR championship squad. The doubles team of Caitlin Whoriskey and Natalie Pluskota reached the semifinals of the NCAA Tournament in tennis, while the 200y medley relay squad of Jenny Connolly, Alex Barsanti, Kelsey Floyd and Michelle King finished runner-up at the NCAA Swimming and Diving Championships.

Joan Cronan

Women's Athletics Director

Triumphant collegiate programs are able to distinguish themselves from their counterparts because of superiority on the field of competition and within the classroom.

Under the vision and direction of Women's Athletics Director Joan Cronan, a heavily-requested speaker on leadership and motivation on the national and local levels, the University of Tennessee Lady Vols have garnered a reputation as one of the most visible and respected programs throughout the nation.

UT's success in both the athletic and academic realms speak volumes to her decision-making and leadership ability, as demonstrated by her appointment to the 2010 NCAA Division I Leadership Council and selection by her peers as the president of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) in 2008-09. Cronan is also a former president of the National Association of Collegiate Women Athletics Administrators (NACWAA).

Both organizations have also honored Cronan as well. She was selected by NACWAA to receive their 2005 Athletic Director of the Year award. In 2004, Cronan was honored by NACDA with their Southeast Region Athletic Director of the Year award. In 2009, the United



States Sports Academy elected Cronan to its Board of Trustee and she was presented with the Women of Achievement Award: "Women Who Make a Difference" by the International Women's Forum.

Now entering her 28th year at Tennessee, Cronan's continued admiration by her peers and the community is well deserved because of her efforts in facilitating the operation of a first-class program, which has finished in the top two in the Southeastern Conference Women's All-Sports Award from The New York Times Regional Newspaper Group for five of the past six years, including three first-place finishes. In three of the past five years, all 11 Lady Vol teams participated in postseason play. The UT women's athletics department achieved a seventh place finish in the 2007 Director's Cup - Tennessee's highest finish ever. She strives not only to keep UT as one of the premier women's athletics departments in the nation but also to improve women's athletics on a local, regional and national level.

Cronan joined UT from the College of Charleston in South Carolina, where she served as the athletics director for 10 years and was later inducted into that institution's hall of fame. Under Cronan, the school was selected as the No. 1 women's athletics program in the country in 1980 by the American Women's Sports Foundation.

Closer to home, Cronan is a past president of the Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame, is active on the boards of First Tennessee Bank and the YMCA, and has served as vice chair of the Leadership Knoxville board. She also works closely with the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and Athletes in Action, having served as a board member for the local FCA chapter and as a national trustee. In 2003, Cronan was inducted into the FCA Hall of Champions. Additionally, she finds time to be a deacon at Central Baptist Church-Bearden.

In 1998, Cronan's work earned her accord from the Knoxville Sports Hall of Fame, as she was named its Administrator of the Year. Other honors include chairing the 1991 Knoxville area United Way Fund Drive, serving as president of the Executive Women's Association, receiving the 1994 Toastmaster's International Communication and Leadership Award and earning the 1994 AOPi Citizen of the Year Award. In March of 1987, the Women's Basketball Coaches Association honored her hard work, dedication and success by presenting her with its leadership award. She also won the 1995 regional award for the National Association of Collegiate Women's Athletic Administrators.

Cronan has served on the NCAA's Executive Committee, Management Council, as well as the NCAA's Council, and is a member of the NCAA Championship Cabinet. She also has

been a member of the Southeastern Conference Executive Committee.

As a former coach, Cronan served a two-year stint at Tennessee from 1968 to 1970. In 1969, she led the women's basketball team to an alternate berth in the first-ever National Invitational Collegiate Basketball Tournament. While at Charleston, she continued her success, not only as a basketball coach but in tennis as well. In 1981, she gave up coaching to devote her full-time attention to her duties as teacher and athletics director.

A graduate of LSU, Cronan earned her B.S. in 1966 and her M.S. in 1968, both in physical education. She was a fall 1995 inductee into LSU's Alumni Hall of Distinction. Currently an avid golfer and tennis player, Cronan was ranked as high as second in the South in doubles and is a former state and Southern doubles champion.

Cronan makes her home in Gettysville. She and her late husband Tom, who passed away on Aug. 18, 2006, after a valiant battle with pancreatic cancer, have two daughters; Kristi (Mrs. Rhett Benner) and Stacey (Mrs. Kent Bristow), both 1994 graduates of UT; three grandsons, Chase Thomas and Reed Kent Bristow, and Quinn Leighton Benner; and two granddaughters, Reese Lauren Benner and Larkin Ann Bristow.

Tennessee Traditions

NICKNAME

The formation of the Women's Intercollegiate Athletics Department for the 1976-77 academic year prompted much discussion concerning a proper nickname for the distaff athletes. After long consideration and debate, it was decided the female student-athletes would be known as "Lady Volunteers" or "Lady Vols."

The University of Tennessee, as the state's land grant university, draws the nickname of its athletic teams (Volunteers) from the name most associated with the state. Tennessee acquired the name "The Volunteer State" in the early days of the 19th Century when General Andrew Jackson mustered large armies from his home state to fight the Indians and later the British at the Battle of New Orleans.

The name became even more prominent in the Mexican War when Governor Aaron V. Brown issued a call for 2,800 men to battle Santa Anna, and some 30,000 volunteered. The name "Volunteers" or "Lady Volunteers" is frequently shortened to "Vols" or "Lady Vols" for the men's and women's athletic teams.

MASCOT

The official mascot is Smokey, a rather pleasant blue tick coon hound that has been on the job since 1953. The dog is a native breed of Tennessee and is in a line of canines used for hunting raccoons. The present Smokey, the ninth in a line of such dogs provided by the family of the late Rev. W.C. Brooks of Knoxville, is appropriately called Smokey IX.

Smokey was chosen as a result of the 1953 Pep Club contest to select a mascot. At Lady Vol events, a human version of Smokey accompanies the cheerleaders.

CHEERLEADERS

Tennessee is one of a handful of women's athletics programs that sponsors its own varsity cheerleading squad complete with full grant-in-aid. The Lady Vol cheerleaders and mascot Smokey are chosen from a large try-out group in the spring.

SCHOOL COLORS

The colors Orange and White were selected by Charles Moore, a member of the first football team in 1891, and were later approved by a vote of the student body. The colors were those of the common American daisy which grew in profusion on "The Hill."

SPORTSMANSHIP

Good sportsmanship is a necessary ingredient for wholesome athletic competition. The University of Tennessee cherishes the reputation its fans, students and athletes have earned for sportsmanship and for extending hospitality to our visitors. The Athletics Department urges Lady Vols fans to conduct themselves in such a way that will enhance the University's reputation for providing a cordial atmosphere at sporting events.

GRADUATION RATE

The Women's Athletics Department at the University of Tennessee is fully committed to the academic progress of each student-athlete in the Lady Vol program. When coaches recruit, they look for talented athletes who will work as hard in the classroom as they do during competition.

In fact, nearly all Lady Vol student-athletes who have remained with the program through their senior years have earned, or are in the process of earning, their degrees. In addition, 620 Lady Vols have been awarded a sum of 1,211 Academic All-Southeastern Conference citations after 47 student-athletes joined the ranks in 2007-08.

ROCKY TOP

Over 40 years ago, a husband-wife song writing team, Boudleaux and Felice Bryant from Gatlinburg, Tenn., penned the song "Rocky Top." Since that time, the tune has emerged as the unofficial fight song for UT athletic teams.
